Koufax Is Back

THE GREATEST left-hander of modern baseball, Sandy Koufax returned to the Los Angeles Dodgers line-up Monday night and promptly fashioned a house cleaning job on Chicago Cubs.

Two weeks out of action with an ailing arm, the 1963 World Series hero put down the Cubs 2-1 in 10 innings on three hits. He struck out 13, the 23rd time in his major league history. He has struck out 10 or more. He needs only two more major league games to tie the major league record of 54 held by Bob Feller and Roy Waddell.

Koufax missed his debut attempt in the eighth inning when Andre Rodgers tagged him for a homer to tie the score 1-1. The Dodgers won it, their eighth victory of the season, in the 10th when Maury Wills scored Dick Tracyway from second with a cleanly hit single.

Dodger manager Walt Alston probably gave a great deal of relief when Koufax came through with such a fine performance. The defending champs, tied for eighth place in the N.L. standings, will probably have visions of another pennant with the return of Koufax. The club's ace lefty Johnny Podres may get a clean bill of health within the next few days. If so, you can expect the Dodgers to be right back in being winning more than their share of games.
