

Cincinnati Boosts NL Lead While Chicago Slips In AL

Cincinnati won a doubleheader, opening up a 1 1/2 game lead over the National League Sunday while the Chicago White Sox lost a doubleheader to Baltimore, cutting their American League lead to 4 1/2 games.

Fists flew in Detroit where the New York Yankees finally shaved Detroit after a Tom Sturdivant Ray Boone bout on Monday.

Don Hoak drove in four of Cincinnati's six runs in a sweep over Brooklyn 31 and 30 with a home run in each game, played before a turnout crowd of 33,650 fans at Ebbets Field. Brooks Lawrence won the first with help from Tom Aker after he was injured and Hal Jeffcoat pitched his first major league shutout in the second, striking out nine Dodgers.

CIT BY CURFEW
The Chicago Cubs tripped up the Phillies 7 in the opener and played them to a 4 tie in the second game, called by the Sunday curfew after nine innings. Actually, the Cubs had scored in the 10th but the score reverted to the ninth inning.

As a result of the defeat, the Phillies are tied with the Dodgers, 1 1/2 games behind Cincinnati.

Milwaukee finished the day in

fourth place, 2 1/2 games back, by splitting a pair with Pittsburgh. It took an lthinning error by Roberto Clemente to help the Braves take the first 2-1 on Johnny Logan's single. Although Hank Aaron hit homers in each game, his 14th and 15th, breaking Ronnie Kline's no-hit bid in the seventh inning of the second game, the Pirates won the second 5-3. Roy Face stopped the Braves with a fine ninth inning relief job.

Stan Musial played his 821st consecutive game, only one short of the National League record set by Gus Suhr of Pittsburgh in 1937, as St. Louis took a doubleheader from New York 21 and 107. Del Ennis' homer helped Vinegar Bend Mizell pitch his first complete game of the season in the first.

RUSH INNING
Eleven Cards went to bat in the sixth, scoring six runs, to nail down the second game of a three-run homer by Don Day curfew after nine innings. Mueller, who had four hits, Baltimore knocked off the White Sox 7-5.

George Kell suffered a possible fracture on the right side of his forehead when he was hit by a Dick Donovan pitch in the second

The Yankees and Tigers slugged it out with fists and bats behind Early Wynn but lost the defense lap by Earl Torgeson after Hank Bauer tried to steal second with the bases loaded in the eighth. Torgeson threw the ball to third while Bill Skowron scooted home with the tiebreaking run.

Earlier in the day Sturdivant, Yankee starter and Boone, Detroit first baseman, were ejected for trading punches between the mound and home plate. After two Detroit homers, Sturdivant threw a fast ball close to Boone's head and the veteran charged toward the mound. They exchanged blows and wrestled each to the ground and players from both teams rushed onto the field.

PINCH-HIT VICTORY
Cleveland beat Washington 7-3 behind Early Wynn but lost the two-run pinch homer in the ninth inning for a 7-6 victory. Roger Maris and Vic Wertz of the Indians each hit two homers in the second game.

The Boston Red Sox hit seven home runs while winning two from Kansas City 8-4 and 9-5. Ted Lepcio and Jimmy Piskall each hit two homers and Ted Williams connected for No. 13 in the Red Sox attack.

Frank Sullivan settled down after a rocky start in the opener and George Susce won the second although he was chased in the eighth.

Fight Manager Jake Mintz Dies
PITTSBURGH (AP) — Fight manager Jake Mintz, who discovered Ezzard Charles and guided him to the world heavyweight boxing crown, died Saturday in hospital after suffering a heart attack.

Mintz, in his 60s, frequently had been warned to curtail his activities because of a coronary condition that had bothered him for the last 10 years.

He discovered Charles while promoting fights and making matches in Pittsburgh. The Cincinnati Negro won the heavyweight crown from Jersey Joe Walcott June 22, 1949.

Mintz, whose latest protegee was Edmondson, died of a heart attack. He had been in the fight business as a boxer, campaigning 40 years ago under the name of Jack O'Boyle.

Mintz was in Charles' corner the night he lost the world title to Walcott in a return bout July 18, 1951. Mintz always said he was responsible.

Lyford Cay Sets Record In Winning Queen's Plate

TORONTO (CP)—Lyford Cay, big bay gelding who was bothered by sore legs earlier in the week, came up with a records-mashing performance Saturday to win the rich Queen's Plate classic on a day that marked the first million-dollar wagering in Canadian turf history.

Records piled up on records over the \$13,000,000 New Woodbine layout as a bet-happy, well-heeled crowd of 26,705 thronged the suburban track for the 80th running of the plate, the oldest annually, continuously-run race in North America.

Lyford Cay, the three-year-old, owned by Toronto industrialist sportsman E. P. Taylor, covered

place money after a mile. The crowd bet \$209,371 on the Plate race alone and more than \$100,000 of this was plunked on the Taylor entry.

The Taylor entry was favorite after winning both divisions of the plate trial last Monday but many observers figured that All's Pride, owned by Wilf Farr of Weston, Ont., and Lad Ator, three-year-old bought this year by M. J. Boylen of Toronto for \$27,500 could win the classic.

All's Pride, 2-to-1 favorite just a week ago, failed badly and finished fifth.

Lad Ator, the winter book favorite, finished ninth.


