Sudden Deaths.

The people of Summerside were greatly shocked and grieved last evening on hearing of the very sudden death of the wife of one of the most prominent townsmen—Mrs. David Rogers. We are informed that she died while sitting in her chair reading a newspaper. She had been unwell for some time past, and under the care of Dr. Bearisto; and it is supposed that she was struck down by apoplexy. Her age was forty-two. She was the eldest daughter of James Gourlie, Esq., Manager of the Savings Bank, &c., and was very highly respected. Mr. Joseph McEwen, another old and prominent resident of Summerside, also died, very suddenly, yesterday.

Cholera in France.

Rome, Sept. 26. The decline of receipts at the Custom Houses of Italy, owing to the prevalence of cholera is estimated at forty million francs. It is impossible to estimate the damage done from the same as to the general trade of the country and the prospects for the coming winter are viewed with great alarm.

The British Contingent.

LONDON, Sept. 26. The contingent of guards who are going to Egypt to form a part of the camel corps, left for Portsmouth to-day. Thousands of people witnessed their departure and cheered them heartily. The rest of the camel corps, to the number of 800, left Aldershot to-day.

Deaths by Cholera.

Rome, Sept. 26. Reports of the ravages of cholera throughout Italy for the past twenty-four hours give a total of 452 fresh cases and 112 deaths. At Naples there were 201 fresh cases and 95 deaths. At Geneva 51 fresh cases.

A Great and Fatal Fall.

ERIE, Pa., Sept. 26. The grand stand on the race course at the County Fair here collapsed this afternoon. Two hundred people were thrown into one mass. One person was killed and four injured.

A Mysterious Disease.

SOUTHAMPTON, LI., Sept. 26. A malignant disease which baffles medical skill is prevailing in the Village of Atlanticville. A number of deaths have occurred, and the disease is spreading rapidly. It is thought by some to be cholera.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 26. The free-for-all trot to-day was won by Fitzsimmons' black stallion, "Island Chief." Sandy Morris won two heats and second money; Helena third. The best time, 2:34.

Brigandage in Egypt.

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 26. Brigandage is seriously increasing in the interior of the country. Lord Northbrook, the British High Commissioner, has gone to examine into the matter.

BOSTON, Sept. 26. Teemer is the favorite in the handicap race to be rowed at Point of Pines to-morrow. The betting is 100 to 70 on Teemer.

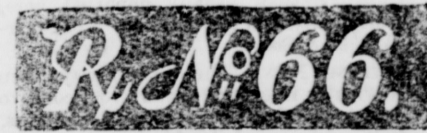

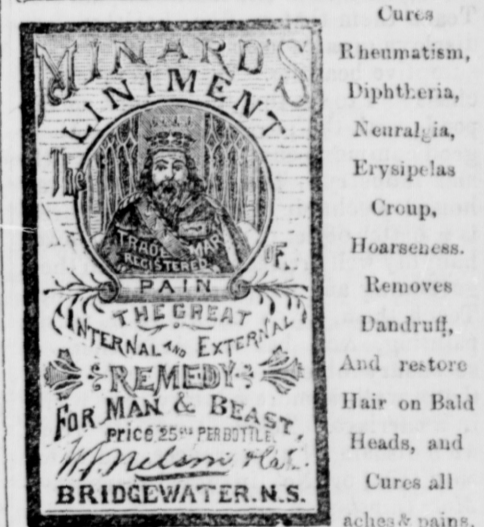
