Clever skirmishing by North-South in the following deal resulted in an excellent contract, but South lost out in the play.

Both sides vulnerable.
Both sides 60 on score.

The bidding:
North East South West

North's notrump opening looks decidedly skimpy, but the partners were playing a special system—duly announced to the opponents—under which they bid very light notrumps in part-score situations such as this. The ultimate merit of this style is open to question, but it should have worked out well in this case. Even with a weakish notrump opposite him, South figured to have a fine play for hearts, so he redoubled.

Actually, there was a fine play for the contract, but South missed it. West opened the heart ace, then shifted to the spade queen. The king won and declarer now made the fatal play of the diamond queen. West won with the ace and led another spade. South discarded a club on the spade ace, then led the diamond four to his own king. Now he cashed the heart king, but when West failed, South saw the possible need of dummy's two remaining trumps and deferred trump drawing in order to lead the diamond ten.

If West had covered the diamond ten, South would have had clear sailing, but West was not that obliging. He ducked, and South had no further chance. He could not establish the diamond suit without conceding a trick to West's jack or an overtrick to East's nine-spot, and so the redoubled contract was down one.

DEAR MISS DIX: Two years ago, at the age of 18, I married a New Englander and left my home in the South to live in his native town. I worked for a year, but gave up my job when our baby was born. My husband has a position with a good future—but very little pay at present. Our debts are mounting, and we have absolutely no money to buy modern household equipment, or for me to get one decent dress. Because I have no presentable clothes, I have little opportunity to make friends. I can't afford the nice dresses or beauty preparations to make me attractive and I live in fear that my husband will be drawn to the beautiful "office dolls" who have money for personal adornment. My husband is very handsome, so my fears aren't wholly unjustified. Or am I just jealous? At any rate, I'm very unhappy.

ANSWER: Your problems go quite a bit deeper than dissatisfaction over a lack of pretty clothes and the groundless fear that your husband will be won away from you. You'll have to dig right down to the roots to discover and cure your trouble. Fundamentally, it's just plain old-fashioned homesickness and loneliness for your own people. The big ogre menacing your life is the "pile of mounting debts"; that certainly should be cut down.

Lack of friends in your new town, plus the constant presence of the green-eyed one, are the finishing touches to a situation that easily could become tragic. But I think you have too much sense to let things overwhelm you once you face a possible solution.

SEEK FRIENDS
To boost your morale, the first step should be a bid for friends. With summer's bright informal and very reasonable clothes, you should be able to afford one or two pretty, inexpensive dresses. If you can't buy them, make them. Even a tyro at sewing could manage a simple summer cotton.

There must be lots of other men at your husband's place of employment who are bringing up families on small salaries. Their wives are faced with the same problems, and doubtless the same self-consciousness that besets you.

Make it your business to become acquainted with some of these women. At 20, you don't need a large stock of beauty preparations to keep your looks—these are intended rather for middle-aged women. Shining hair, clear eyes, bright complexion, sparkling teeth and a slim figure are yours by right of youth. Be a cheerful, pleasant companion and you won't have to worry about hubby straying. The girls in his office have their own problems.

Change your outlook on the world, then get busy with a budget, make it stick, and try to dissolve that mountain of debt. Money management is something that must be learned just like cooking or sewing. At 20, you can't be proficient in all these things, but you can try to

Moths
