Mansfield is touring Eastern Canada giving demonstrations at tennis clinics under the sponsorship of the Junior Board of Trade and the Pepsi-Cola Company of Canada.

These clinics are held in different cities across Canada in order to create more interest in the game and also to improve the caliber of the players.

The following is the programme for the day: Mansfield will arrive at the Charlottetown Tennis Club at 10 o'clock and will be met by the club officials and Pepsi-Cola officials.

Shortly after ten o'clock Mansfield will begin instructions to junior players and any seniors wishing to attend.

In the afternoon senior members of the club will be given instructions in teaching methods so that they may in turn give instructions to junior members in the future.

Mansfield will engage senior members of the Charlottetown Club in an exhibition of singles and doubles matches and the day will be rounded out with a tea served by the lady members of the club.

Local junior tennis hopefuls are urged to attend the morning classes.

World Records Still Being Smashed At B.E. Games

CARDIFF (CP)—A world record was shattered and another tied, athletes sprang and slid over the track in desperate bids for glory and a protest took away a British Empire Games bronze medal from a young Canadian in one of the most dazzling

days in the history of the Commonwealth sport festival. Even a dog got into the act. Under a hot sun and with a screaming sellout crowd of 33,000 at Cardiff Arms Park, athletes from 35 countries had a memorable day, comparable to the final afternoon of the 1954 games at Vancouver.

That was the day two men broke the four-minute mile in the same race for the first time and marathoner Jim Peters dragged a paralyzed leg in a fruitless search for victory.

RECORD THROW
Thursday world record fell in one of the least dramatic events. Most of the spectators were watching the performances on the track when Mrs. Anna Pazera, a Polish-born housewife from Australia, hurled the javelin 188 feet, four inches, more than five feet farther than any woman had done before.

Two Australians and a Jamaican won their second gold medals of the games with Mrs. Marie Matthews-Willard equaling the official world record of 23.6 seconds as she added the 220-yard dash to her 100-yard title.

The second Australian double winner was Dave Power, 24-year-old New South Wales bank official who won the six-mile title last Saturday. Power, who had never completed a marathon race before, breezed to victory in the fastest time the gruelling race has ever been run in the games—two hours, 22 minutes, 45.6 seconds.

GARDNER BRILLIANT
Jamaica's Keith Gardner, beaten in a photo finish for the 220-yard dash title, added the 120-yard hurdles to his 100-yard crown a few minutes later for the greatest individual medal-winning spree of the games.

Games records fell like meteors throughout the afternoon and Canadian athletes shared in the spurge.

They also had their share of tough luck when 21-year-old Pete Stanger of Montreal stood helplessly by as the referee and jury of appeal listened to a South African protest over placings in the 120 hurdles and eventually reversed the original decision that medal.

The decision revolved around South Africa's Jacobus Swartz, who fell just as he approached the finish line. The judges placed him sixth and last, placing Stanger third behind Gardner and Pakistan's Ghulam Razik.

When the South African protested, the officials looked at the photo-finish picture and found that the falling Springsbok had slid across the line in second place. Razik was placed third and Stanger lost his medal.

MEDALS WON
But the Canadians didn't go without medals, thanks to record-breaking performances by Winnipeg's Jack Smyth, second in the hop, step and jump, and Terry Tobacco of Cumberland, B.C., third in the men's 400-yard final.

Margaret Iwasaki of Vancouver grabbed another bronze medal behind Beverly Bainbridge of Australia and Tessa Staveley of New Zealand in the games inaugural of the 110-yard butterfly, one of the two swimming finals decided in the evening.

The men's 220-yard butterfly went to Ian Black of Scotland

Yanks Blast Tigers 10-7; Redbirds Shutout Braves

New York's mighty Yankees continued to feast on Detroit pitching by walloping their way to a 10-7 victory over the Tigers in one of five daylight games in the major leagues Thursday.

The American League-leading Yankees pinned the defeat on Jim Bunning, who last Sunday hurled a no-hitter.

But their triumph was marred by loss of their young relief ace, Ryne Duren, a leading candidate for rookie-of-the-year honors. Duren was hit on the head in the ninth inning by a pitch thrown by Paul Foytack. He was carried from the field on a stretcher and taken to a Detroit hospital for examination.

In other American League games, Cleveland's Gary Bell tossed a three-hitter to beat Washington 6-1; Milt Pappas pitched and batted Baltimore Orioles to a 7-3 win over Chicago White Sox, and Boston at Kansas City was postponed because of rain.

In the National League St. Louis shut out Milwaukee 4-0, cutting the league leaders' margin in the team sabre competition.

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over San Francisco Giants to a half-game, while Pittsburgh beat Los Angeles Dodgers 5-3.

The Yankees crushed four home runs, two off Bunning, the skinny righthander who held Boston hitless in his last start.

The Tigers built up an early lead, but Marv Throneberry shaved it to 5-4 for the Yankees with a three-run homer in the seventh. Yogi Berra's two-run blast in the eighth put the Yankees ahead. Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle cleared the fences after Duren had been felled in the ninth.

The New Yorkers thus swept the three-game series, as the Tigers lost their eighth loss in nine games and dropped to seventh place, 1 1/2 games off the pace.

Catcher Russ Nixon had four hits including a home run and drove in four runs to help the Indians beat Washington. Bell evened his season record at 44, as the Tribe won their third game of the four-game series.

Pappas, only 19, held Chicago
