LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

PREACHING.—The Rev. D. McNeill will (D. V.) preach a Gaelic sermon on next Sabbath, the 17th inst., at Church of Street Hall, at 4 p. m. All Gaelic-speaking people are cordially invited to attend.

WRIGHT'S BRIDGE.—It is stated that Wright's Bridge, near this city, is one of those that are a dangerous state. Really the Public Works Department ought to wake up before next election.

SOME CHEESE.—More shipments of cheese have been made from Charlottetown and Summerside to Montreal in the Campania during the past few days. Excelsior 2,727 boxes were shipped from Charlottetown and 1540 from Summerside.

PICKING MAYFLOWERS.—Jonathan Morrison, of Springfield, Annapolis, N. S., on the 8th inst., picked a bouquet of Mayflowers. The bouquet consisted of a dozen stalks, and the flowers were as perfect as if picked in the month of May.

CITY TAXES.—Defaulters in real estate taxes are reminded that the list of those in arrears has been made ready for publication. Those who do not like to see their names in print should pay up at once. Executions are being issued for personal property and poll tax defaulters.

THE NEW READING ROOM.—The Lyceum has been secured for the new reading room and gymnasium and the work of fitting it up has already begun. The reading room proper will be on the main floor. The basement will be fitted up for a bowling alley and gymnasium, and the rooms over the stage will be utilized for various games.

AN ISLANDER ROBBED.—A St. John despatch of the 14th says: Bernard Heron, 57 years of age, applied to the Chief of Police of St. John for assistance to get to P. E. Island, where he had a residence. He left Portland yesterday, but was robbed of \$164 and a watch on the train. He has not been on the island for twenty-two years.

The large city hall in Fredericton has been used by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter for holding special meetings for men. The seats, aisles and platform were all crowded by men eager to hear the truth. The meetings are reported to have been of extraordinary interest. Messrs. Crossley and Hunter commence their services in this city in the First Methodist Church next Sunday.

MORE INSURANCE FRAUDS.—In the wake of the smuggling frauds in Newfoundland comes the news that the police believe they have discovered a wholesale system of insurance frauds, whereby vessels insured were cast away, and that goods alleged to be one load them were never loaded, but insurance collected on their value just the same. A large number of arrests are promised.

EGG TESTER.—William T. Chute, of Bridgetown, has invented and patented an egg tester. The device consists of a box, 9 1/2 in. with a sloping top, and having a capacity for testing six eggs at one time. It can be used with equal satisfactory results any time through the day, or by artificial light, and that instantaneous results are obtained. The condition of an egg is in placed in the box.

HE PREFERS JAIL.—A man named Elbridge Verax, of Sheffield, Sunbury county, is in jail in Oromocto for debt. He has been there 11 months and is likely to stay there for some time. It has transpired, however, that he has money in the savings bank, more than enough to pay the judgment against him. He says if he drew the money out it would send him to the lunatic asylum and that he would rather stay in jail than go to the lunatic asylum. He is 35 years of age and unmarried.—Moncton Times.

A GREAT SUCCESS.—The supper and entertainment in the basement of the First Methodist Church last evening was voted "a great success." The attendance was larger than was expected, and that is really much. After supper was over and the "Mysterious Men" was critically examined, an interesting programme was disposed of in a most acceptable manner. Miss Winnie Collins, Mrs. Hammond Large and Mrs. Bo-well, each contributed a vocal solo. Messrs. Johnson, Smith, Cook and Bentley a quartette; Captain Weeks and Miss White a reading each; the Misses Fennell and McPherson two piano duets; and Rev. Mr. Caspary, Rev. Mr. Campbell made an excellent chairman.

ST. JAMES' HALL. The new hall in connection with St. James' Church is now approaching completion. The church has since its erection been the most beautiful edifice of its kind in the city, and the addition that has been made lends amplitude to its exterior and extends to its interior. The hall, which cannot be reached before passing the ticket office, is sufficiently large to hold a good audience of five hundred persons. On two sides there are class-rooms, etc., the partitions of which are upon rollers and can be raised so that the whole area can be thrown into one spacious apartment. For the ordinary practical purposes of the church the arrangements are exceedingly well conceived. At the front there may be either one or two sunny rooms in which the sewing circle may meet or the Bible class be held. At the rear there are classrooms for the smaller children and a library. The larger of these class-rooms is furnished with high tables and benches, and the teachers may demonstrate the lesson of the day. The auditorium will be used on Sundays for the Sunday school and on week day evenings for lectures, concerts, socials, etc. Altogether the new hall is a capital addition to the premises of St. James Church, and will long reflect credit upon those who put their money into it and those who built it. We have but one regret in respect to it, and that is that the side and rear walls are not of stone as well as the front. Mr. McGregor, the contractor, is to be complimented upon the celebrity with which he pushed forward the work. The corner stone was laid on Saturday, Jan. 15, and the hall will be ready for the opening on Thanksgiving evening. We congratulate the architect and the committee upon the work so promptly and well done under their superintendence.

CHRISTIAN BROTHER DEAD.—The San Francisco Monitor contains a lengthy obituary of Rev. Brother Julian of the Christian Brothers, which occurred at the Matinez Novitiate on the afternoon of October 14, after an illness extending over several months. Brother Julian was known to the world as John Macdonald, and was native of Prince Edward Island. He entered the order of the Christian Brothers over twenty years ago, and at the time of his death was 52 years of age. Before entering the order Brother Julian was a carpenter, which trade he continued after joining the Brothers, and he was given the supervision of the construction of St. Mary's College at Oakland. A model of the college which was made by him, was on exhibition at the World's Fair Chicago, and at the Midwinter Exposition, in San Francisco. Brother Julian was noted for his genial disposition, and he was a great favorite among his confreres. Though suffering intensely during his last illness, he never complained, accepting his cross with Christian resignation and fortitude. His funeral was largely attended.

BENEATH THE WAVES.—The number of Gloucester fishing schooners lost during the year was eleven, of a total tonnage of 912.02 tons, representing a value of some \$70,000 and an insurance of \$53,072. The whole number of lives lost in the fisheries, including deaths at sea, drownings in port, etc., has been 94, against 137 for the previous year, when 20 vessels of a tonnage of 2,423.42 tons, valued at \$175,000, and 100 lives were lost. The lost seamen include John Nolan and Abraham Stewart, of Prince Edward Island. Nolan fell overboard in Bennett's dock, on June 28, and Stewart was lost on the George's Banks in February. The former was 60 years of age, and the latter 30.

FOUND DROWNED.—On Friday morning Mrs. Alfred Veinot, living near the La-Have river, at New Germany, left her mother, Mrs. George Johnson, aged 80 years, in bed, when she went to the stable to milk her cows. The mother was nowhere to be found when Mrs. Veinot returned. Early on Saturday morning her remains were found floating near the shore of Veinot's lake five miles from her late home. The body had floated down the river and drifted across the lake.—Halifax Herald.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY.—A few nights ago a sentry near the Garrison church Halifax found the door of the church open. He entered in the darkness and heard the shuffling of feet near the altar. The soldier then shut the door and ran to the guard house, a few rods away, where he called out the guard. A party of soldiers immediately turned out and searched diligently, but found no trace of the burglar, except an empty bag below one of the windows. This church has before been robbed of its collections.

CONCERNING THE CHAMPIONSHIP.—According to a late despatch from Dallas, Tex., William A. Grady has telegraphed to Dan A. Stuart, for J. J. Cobett, saying: "Corbett surrenders championship and belt to Maher, and will back Maher for \$10,000 against Fitzsimmons." The tele-gram was forwarded to Stuart at El Paso, who sent the following reply to his Dallas representative: "Tell Grady that Corbett had better win that belt before he disposes of it."

GOOD SLEEPING.—It is said that there is sleighing all along the Intercolonial from Quebec and northern New Brunswick.

The zoological department at Cornell University has purchased some monkey, whose brains are destined ultimately for Dr. Wilder. They are now alarmed over the discovery that one of them, a young monkey not half grown, has taken to eating the end of his own tail, and that he has already devoured quite an inch of it. If he cannot be stopped he will reach the dissecting table much before he is wanted. It is suggested that the effects of attending a great university have led this monkey to an effort to develop unaided into a man.

Recent rains have raised the St. John (N. B.) river, and hopes are entertained of a large portion of the 25,000,000 logs now hung up on the booms before navigation closes.

DAMAGES FOR CANADIAN SEALERS
WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The convention looking to the settlement of claims arising out of the captures of Canadian sealing vessels in Behring Sea, prior to the Paris award, is practically finished. It provides for a joint commission consisting of one representative each from Great Britain and the United States to meet at Victoria, B. C., to assess the damages suffered by Canadians. If two commissioners fail to agree, a third member will be chosen.
