

# Sees Room For Increase In Trade With Mexicans

MONTREAL (CP)—Trade between Canada and Mexico could be substantially increased, says the Mercantile Bank of Canada.

In an 18 page booklet entitled "Meet Mexico," the bank says statistical data indicated that Canada could supply Mexico a large number of items now purchased from the United States.

In 1955 Canadian exports to Mexico amounted to \$37,000,000. United States exports to Mexico in the corresponding period totaled \$700,000,000.

"Purchases from Canada amounted to only three per cent of Mexican imports," the bank said.

Mexico was engaged in an "in-

terest" program of economic development which boded well for the expansion of Canadian exports, particularly those needed for industrial progress.

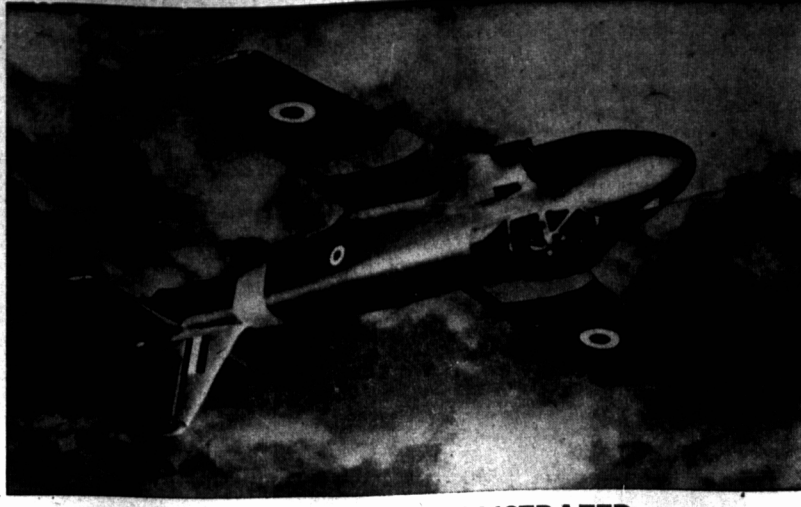
Official Mexican sources were quoted as saying the Mexican market could offer good prospects for Canadian barley, nickel, asbestos and chemical fertilizers.

Statistics indicated Canadian exporters might study eventual market possibilities for eggs in the shell, antibiotics, television sets and parts, radio parts, disinfectants, animal fats, synthetic

resins, explosives, iron and steel pipes and tubes.

Canada ranked third behind the U.S. and West Germany in total exports to Mexico. Principal exports from this country to Mexico in order of total value shipped were cellulose products, steel rails, newsprint, iron railway track material, aluminum in primary forms, miscellaneous drugs and chemicals, machinery parts and asbestos parts and asbestos milled fibres.

Canadian importers "might benefit" from studying trade possibilities of Mexican sugar, onions, concentrated fruit juices, pineapple, melons, vanilla and vegetable waxes.

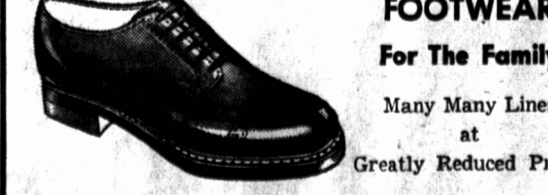
