GERMAN WOMEN WELL AND NEATLY DRESSED; USE LIPSTICK SPARINGLY

Editor's Note: This story is one of a series giving the impressions gained by a Canadian reporter during a two-week tour of West Germany. Tomorrow: Canadian troops get along well with Germans. By W. R. WHEATLEY, Canadian Press Staff Writer. A smart promoter for lipstick might do a rich business in West Germany.

Use of lipstick appears only now to be catching on slowly there. The number of buxom lassies and older women especially—who wear no makeup is remarkable. Those who use lipstick do so sparingly.

In proportion, more women seemed to be lipstick users in Berlin than in other cities, and Berlin lipstick is worn in hotels and restaurants, particularly by evening diners, than in the streets.

NEATLY DRESSED

The average German is well and neatly dressed. Styles and cut of men's and women's clothes lack the sharpness and extra touches we know, but these differences may easily go unnoticed. The German leans toward the more sombre colors.

Shoes aren't up to Canadian standards. Even the most expensive lack smartness. A Canadian woman living in Germany said she often notices German women looking at her shoes; "they can spot the difference in a flash."

The average German family must budget closely. I was told the average wage is 300 to 325 marks a month—about \$75 to \$125 in Canadian money, though this is not an index of the mark's purchasing power in terms of commodities. In terms of Canadian funds, many articles and staples are cheaper in Germany.

A married office worker in a government department said his salary is 417 marks a month and his income tax is 31 marks.

INCLUDE SPECIAL TAX

The taxes include a special tax to pay for restoration of war-damaged churches and a Berlin emergency tax to aid the disabled, and isolated former Reich capital. A turnover tax of four per cent, corresponding to our sales tax, is levied on both retailers and manufacturers.

There are also many other taxes—inheritance tax, property tax, commercial capital tax, land tax, corporation tax, commercial yields tax, etc.

A government pamphlet admits the large number of tax types is tough on business. "A business enterprise with a capital of 1,000,000 marks and a turnover of 2,000,000 marks, even though it shows no profit, has to pay 60,000 marks turnover tax, 55,000 marks property tax and 61,800 marks profits tax levied on property tax—a total of 176,800 marks, i.e., a rate of interest of nearly 20 per cent in favor of inland revenue.

"Only where profits exceed this rate of 20 per cent will there be something left for the corporation and its shareholders. This balance is then subjected to the normal capital yields tax."

The pamphlet says a total profit of 360,000 marks, in the case mentioned, would leave 54,500 marks for the corporation, making the actual tax burden 85 per cent.

HOME COMFORTS

STOCKHOLM (CP)—Every fourth home in Sweden has a washing machine, according to a dealers' survey. The report said it costs at least \$1,400 today to furnish a complete modern kitchen with such items as range with grill, refrigerator with freezing compartment, washing machine, vacuum cleaner and dishwashing machine.

Political Prophets Have Difficulty In Forecasting New Zealand Election

AUCKLAND, N. Z. (CP)—A wholesale redistribution of seats and the first full-scale effort by a third party in many years, have combined to confuse political prophets attempting to forecast the result of New Zealand's general election Nov. 13.

The House of Representatives still contains 80 seats, but the boundary of almost every electorate has been changed. Half a dozen seats have been eliminated and new ones created in areas of heavy population gain.

As a result several members of the last House are standing against each other. Others have changed their constituencies or are contesting renamed seats containing only a small proportion of their former constituents.

The full-scale electoral effort by a third party, the Social Credit Political League, also complicates the result. Few outside the Social Credit ranks think the party will have much success, but the effect of the votes it wins in closely contested seats could well be decisive.

In the last House, the National party government had 50 seats, Labor 30. Records of recent elections show a steady swing from left to right. Labor's number of seats has steadily dwindled at each election since 1935 when it had 55. The National party has just as evenly improved its stand-

ing at each election. It had 39 seats in 1935. The Communist influence is negligible. For the coming election, 24 candidates were nominated: Labor 80, National party 79, Social Credit 79, Communist 8, independents and others 9.

SINGLE CHAMBER

New Zealand is the only self-governing country in the British Commonwealth with a single-chamber Parliament. The upper House, the legislative council, was abolished several years ago. Consideration is to be given at some future time to the question of re-establishing the second Chamber in a new form.

Of the 80 seats, 76 are European white and four Maori. The entire country is divided into four electorates for the Maori constituencies, for which only Maoris may be candidates. In Parliament, the Maoris have equal rights with European MPs.
