### OBITUARY.

It is with feelings of deep regret that we announce the death of Mary Alice, beloved wife of P. J. Berrigan, Esq., which sad event occurred at her home Dundee on the 22nd inst. The deceased was in the 50th year of her age, and enjoyed perfect health until about two years ago when symptoms of a fatal malady suddenly manifested themselves. Despite the efforts of the best medical skill, and the unceasing care and attention of anxious nurses, the dreaded disease progressed rapidly, and claimed its victim. Mrs. Berrigan, with remarkable fortitude and calmness of mind, prepared herself for the coming of the dread messenger. At the inception of the disease she cheerfully resigned herself to the Divine Will, and strengthened and fortified herself for the severe trial she was about to suffer by the reception of sacraments and other acts of devotion. In these she placed all her trust, and it was these sweet consolations of our holy religion that comforted her during a long and painful illness, and enabled her to bear her sufferings in such a truly christian manner. The patience with which she bore affliction, her cheerful conversation, and implicit trust in God greatly edified the many friends who visited her. Mrs. Berrigan was a woman of cheerful spirit, warm and kindly sympathies, and an unostentatious charity which gained the respect and esteem of all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Although the end was not unexpected, yet the sad news was a shock to her friends and relatives.

On Tuesday, the 24th the funeral cortege proceeded to St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, where a Mass of Requiem was sung by the Rev. P. Curran, Rector of St. Dunstan's College, after which her remains were consigned to their last resting place in the church-yard adjoining. Besides the officiating clergyman, and the pastor Rev. D. B. Reid, Rev. Dr. Monaghan, Rev. J. McDonald, Kirkora, and the Rev. J. A. McDonald, Missouche were present, and assisted at the obsequies. The pall-bearers were Messrs H. McMillan, Jas. Wynn, D. O'Connell, Owen King, Jas. Trainer and Jno. McManus.

The large number of all denominations who notwithstanding the busy season, formed the funeral cortege, was an eloquent tribute to the worth of the deceased, and evinced how highly she was esteemed by the people amongst whom she resided.

Deceased was born at New London, P. E. Island, and in 1876 was married to the late Dr. Cahill, Lynn Mass, of which union one son (student of St. Dunstan's College) survives. In 1886 she was married to Mr. P. J. Berrigan who with one little girl deeply feels the loss of a good wife and a tender mother. Besides these she leaves one sister and a brother, with a large number of friends and relatives to mourn their irreparable loss to all of whom we tender our warmest sympathies in their sad bereavement. A fond mother, a loving wife an affectionate sister has passed.
