

CITY SCHOOLS.

Midsummer Examinations.

The third and last of the examinations for this season took place to-day at West Kent Street School. A good many visitors were in attendance. The classes were examined by Messrs. LePage and McLeod, of Prince of Wales College, Hon. D. Laird, Miss Barr, Miss Lawson, Miss Ellen Lawson and others. Proficiency was manifested in the various departments and good order prevailed. The school is evidently well disciplined and progressive under an excellent staff of teachers.

After the examination an entertainment was given in the upper hall. There were on the platform His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. David Laird, Rev. W. R. Frame, Rev. John McLeod, Mr. L. H. Davies, M. P., P. Blake, Esq., M. P., P., Donald Farquharson, M. P., P., Thomas Handrahan, John Ings, Mr. T. A. LePage, and Dr. Taylor, and the hall was well filled with visitors. The singing was a most pleasing feature of the entertainment. It was sweet in tone and in capital time, showing very careful training as well as natural talent of a high order. The recitations, too, were well given.

W. E. Dawson took occasion to bestow high and well deserved praise upon the teachers of all the City Schools, and to say that, having visited the best schools of the same class in the Old Country, he had come to the conclusion that our schools had been raised to a position second to none.

The Lieutenant-Governor delivered a short complimentary address, and suggested having a Roll of Honor at each of the Schools.

Dr. Taylor announced that he would give a sovereign in gold as a prize to the best reciter at the next annual examination.

Mr. L. H. Davies, M. P., referred to the diligence, perseverance and public spirit of the School Board, who had performed their duties without salary or reward to the great satisfaction of the citizens.

Address to the Queen.

At the regular meeting of the Caledonian Club, held last evening, the following address was passed unanimously, and ordered to be forwarded by His Honor the Lieut. Governor to the Governor-General for transmission to the Queen:

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty:

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, on behalf of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island, beg leave to express our most hearty congratulations on the happy advent of the fiftieth year of your Majesty's accession to the Throne of the United Empire. The Caledonian Club of this Province of the Dominion of Canada is a National Society, composed of Scotchmen and their descendants, whose chief objects are the promotion of a taste for the language and literature of Scotland, and the perpetuation of that national and loyal sentiment characteristic of Scotchmen and their sons the world over.

The Caledonian Club feels itself called upon to express its deep felt gratitude to Almighty God for the many years of peace, prosperity and happiness which Scotchmen, in common with their fellow subjects at home and abroad, have enjoyed under your Majesty's long and glorious career, during which Canada has grown from a few scattered colonies into a powerful Dominion, stretching from ocean to ocean, and connecting by its iron path the European to the Asiatic portions of your Majesty's domain.

We review with pride the marvellous growth of your Majesty's Empire—the settlement and civilization of vast territories—the spread of Christianity, the rapid advance of the sciences, the development of wonderful improvements in the mechanic arts—the universal expansion of trade and commerce, the general diffusion of literature and education among all classes of your Majesty's subjects.

At ten o'clock in the evening the ship will be illuminated. They will also take part in the proceedings on Friday, and the Captain and officers will attend the jubilee entertainment in the Market Hall in the evening.
