Mr. Kirby, assisted by Rev. Mr. Lodge. SCOTT ACT.—Four Scott Act cases came up for adjudication at Montague Bridge on Wednesday before Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer. The defendants were Annie McPhee and Frank Robertson, of Montague Bridge; Mrs. Ledwell, of Georgeown, and Mary Ann Martin, of Murray Harbor South. Annie McPhee was fined \$50 or two months imprisonment, and the summons against Mrs. Ledwell was dismissed. The case against Mrs. Ledwell and Frank Robertson was adjourned for judgment. LAST NIGHT'S ROAD RACE.

Frank Cannon Wins the Championship of the Province. Excitement ran high last night among the cyclists of Charlottetown on the occasion of the road race to decide the championship of the Island. The course was the same as that taken about a week ago, viz, from Honston's Hotel, Brackley Point Road, to Charlottetown, ending near the P. E. Island Hospital, at the head of the St. Peter's Bay. The distance is about fourteen miles. There were nineteen starters, Cannon, Prowse, Davies, Carbonell, Pickard, Harvie, Mason, McLeod and Pea. In a long and exciting race Cannon and Prowse were the principal contestants and Cannon was the victor.

A PROMINENT RESIDENT OF ANNANDALE PASSES AWAY

Died at Annandale, on the 21st inst, after a few days' illness, William Norton, Esq., one of the oldest and most prominent residents of the County. Mr. Norton was born in England in 1821. He was twice married, his first wife being the daughter of the late Mr. Underlay, his second, who survives him, the eldest daughter of the late Mr. John Townshend, of Rollo Bay. He was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, and was a Governor of the County. Up to within three days of his death he possessed the very best of health. On Friday last a horse which was leading to a tree started to run. He crossed the road and suddenly falling heavily on his head. Carried home in an unconscious state, he rallied after a while, but soon symptoms began to appear which ended fatally, as above a sad. His wife and family have the sympathy of the community in their sad affliction.

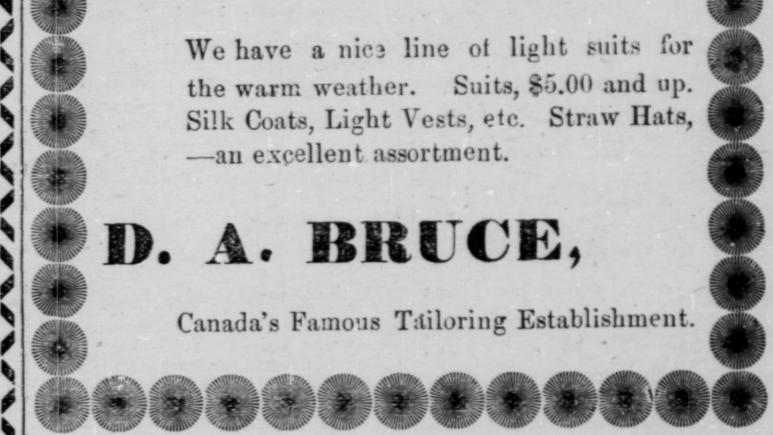
