

The Potato Bug in Queen's Co., N.S.

A correspondent from Canning, N.S., signing himself "C." sends the following regarding this familiar insect: "In ancient days Providence was pleased to send among the people of that time various destructive insects, such as grasshoppers, caterpillars, canker worms and locusts (which latter were simply an original edition of the June bug) as well as other pests—blight, mildew and hail unto the slaying of their cattle and the herds thereof.
