### 10th Of Canada's 14 Destroyer E's To Be Launched

OTTAWA (CP) — Launching of the Margaree, 10th destroyer escort in the navy's current 14-ship program, will take place March 29 at Halifax Shipyards Ltd., the defence department announced.

Mrs. R. E. S. Bidwell, wife of the flag officer, Atlantic coast, will sponsor the ship. The Margaree will be the second destroyer escort launched at Halifax shipyards. The first, the Saganay, was launched in August, 1953, and now is nearing completion. She is scheduled to be commissioned late this year.

ST. LAURENT FIRST

The first ship of the class, the St. Laurent, now is in service. She was commissioned last Oct. 29 at Canadian Vickers Ltd., Montreal.

The new Margaree is the second Canadian warship to bear the name. The first Margaree was sunk Oct. 22, 1940, in a collision with a merchant ship after only 1 1/2 months in service. Of the destroyers and men, 142 were lost.

The Margaree is named after Cape Breton island's Margaree river, famed salmon fishing stream.

## U.K. Gov't Seeks To Induce Farmers To Boost Production

LONDON (Reuters)—The government, bidding to strengthen the economy through greater all-round output, announced Thursday a £25,000,000 inducement to British farmers to boost their production.

It increased by this amount its obligation to underwrite prices farmers get for their produce in the open market. Over a variety of products ranging from beef to sugar beets, a subsidy is provided when necessary to make up the deficiency between current market prices and those guaranteed by the government.

In the financial year 1955-1956, the government estimated £250,000,000 would be needed to guarantee farm prices but only £214,000,000 has been required.

The annual review of farm prices, published Thursday as a white paper, disclosed increased guarantees for cattle, sheep, milk, potatoes, barley, oats and sugar beets. There are small reductions in the guarantees for pigs, wool, wheat and rye.

They result from recent talks between the National Farmers Union and the ministry of agriculture on how the farmers can help—and be helped—to narrow ominous monthly gaps in Britain's world balance of payments.

Imports GREATER

Britain currently is importing much more than she is able to pay for out of her own export earnings. Greater farm production would cut down the imports bill and to some extent help the export drive.

But farmers have a big problem. Their production costs went up last year by an estimated £35,000,000. The new government increased guarantees are meant to help them over this hurdle.

Cereal guarantees for 1957 have been readjusted by reducing those for wheat and rye and increasing those for barley and oats for livestock feeding, thus cutting down Britain's heavy imports bill under this reading.

### Nehru To Visit The United States

WASHINGTON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Nehru of India has accepted the invitation of President Eisenhower to visit the United States this year, it was learned Friday.

The invitation was originally extended by Eisenhower some time ago but it was renewed last week by State Secretary Dulles in the course of talks in New Delhi with Nehru.

Nehru is understood to have suggested alternative dates to Eisenhower for his visit, possibly after the meeting of the Commonwealth prime ministers in London this summer.

It will be the first visit of Nehru to the United States since 1949.

GRONCHI BACK IN ITALY

ROME (AP) — Italy's President Giovanni Gronchi returned Thursday, apparently deeply impressed from his 17-day "friendly visit" and high-level talks in the United States and Canada.

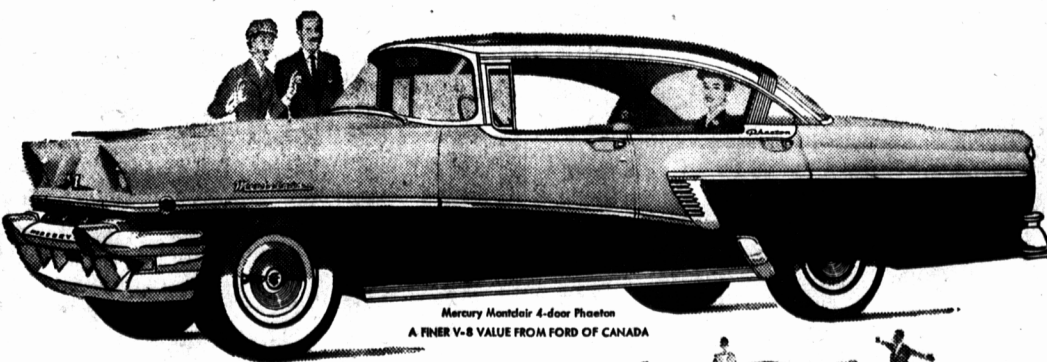

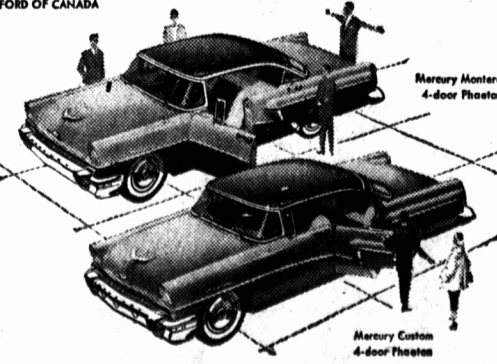
