Contract Bridge

No matter how South played the following hand, he had to incur some risk, but his actual plan was out the best.

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
Pass	Pass	1♣	Pass
3NT	Pass	Pass	Pass

West opened the spade five. South won with the nine and cashed dummy's six clubs, discarding a diamond, a heart, and a spade from his own hand.

The heart suit was wide open, so South could not well hope for another spade trick; he had to try the diamond finesse. When this lost it was all over—West shifted to hearts and East ran the suit. It is only fair to concede that South had a problem in this deal. After he won with the spade nine, only seven more tricks were in sight, and the ninth trick would entail a risk. It is understandable that he did not want to lead a spade right back at the second trick, because the opponents might shift to hearts, with fatal result. Nevertheless, that was a better line of play than depending on the diamond finesse. Setting up a spade trick immediately could not go wrong unless West, the obvious holder of the spade ace, had at least four hearts including one of the high honors. That is to say, if West got in with the spade ace and shifted to hearts, South would not have to lose more than three tricks in the suit (which he could afford to lose) unless it was West, not East who had the heart length.

Observe that as the cards lay (and as they figured to lie) the heart shift by West at an early stage would not jeopardize South's contract. On West's shift to the heart seven, East would play the ace and return the jack, but South would only have to duck to block the suit.

Crowd Sees Death On Highway



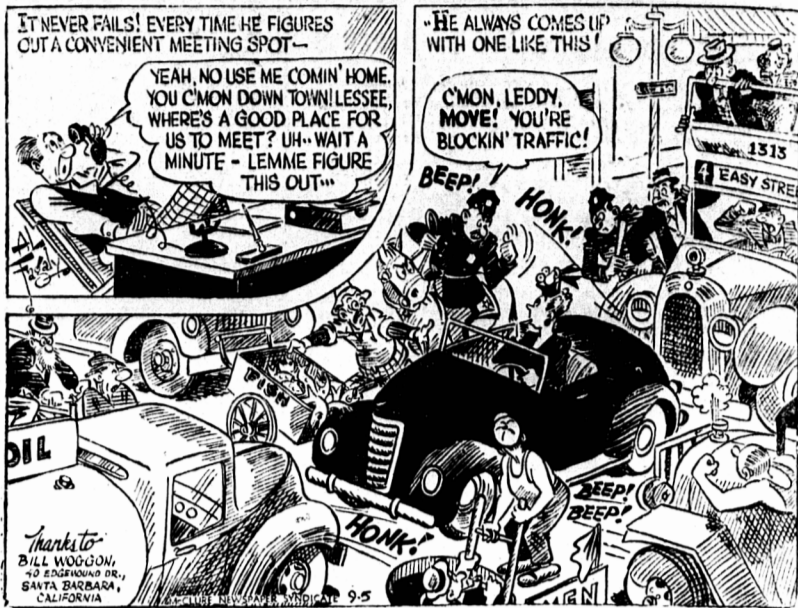
