13 Jr. Red Cross Delegates From P.E.I. Attend Sessions

Nearly 10 delegates from the Atlantic provinces and Quebec will attend the 10th annual high school leadership training course of the Junior Red Cross. All delegates are sponsored by their various high schools for the course, which opens tomorrow at Acadia University in Wolfville, N.S., and continues until July 16.

A number of guests from the United States will round out the group.

Purpose of the centre is to train students and teachers-sponsors in all aspects of Red Cross work, including the learning and practicing of leadership skills, so they can conduct branches in their schools.

Bill Hamilton, high school principal from Halifax will be director of the centre, and Mrs. Blanche Baker, director of

HALIFAX (CP) - The weather office says drier air is slowly pushing across the district and as a result all except the most eastern regions will have considerable sunshine today with afternoon temperatures in many localities climbing to the 70s.

Today is expected to be mainly sunny in all three provinces as the drier air becomes well

established over the district. Regional forecasts: Halifax and vicinity, South Shore, Annapolis Valley, North-eastern N.S., Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties and Bay of Chaleur: Cloudy with sunny intervals; temperatures much the same as Sunday; light winds. Low-high at Halifax, Yarmouth, Moncton and Campbellton 56 and 70, Kentville 60 and 75, New Glasgow 55 and 70, Charlottetown 60 and 68.
