Case Goes to Jury Today

Sheppard Avows He Is Innocent

CLEVELAND (AP)—Dr. Samuel Sheppard placed his life in a jury's hands Thursday with an avowal of innocence and—in his own writer words—a calm, unyielding, fearless faith in God.

The case of the 30-year-old osteopath accused of the July 4 murder of his wife, Marilyn, goes today to a jury that holds the power to send him to the electric chair.

Defence counsel William J. Corrigan read into the court record in his closing argument a portion of a letter he said Dr. Sheppard wrote from his jail cell. The date was not specified.

"Finally, I am completely free of any desire for revenge," the passage read. "I find that I have no anger in my heart toward those who pressed for my arrest."

"Ladies and gentlemen, they would have you believe this man jumped up out of a sound sleep, ran up the stairs and battered his wife to death—for what, for why and with what? No weapon has ever been produced.

There is only one judge that any of us should truly fear and I face him without hesitation or apprehension.

Corrigan made an impassioned two-hour plea as he wound up the defence case for Dr. Sheppard. The defendant was moved to quiet tears more than once as he listened attentively.

Dr. Sheppard says a bushy-haired prowl bear his pregnant, 31-year-old wife to death in her bed July 4.

The state says he killed Marilyn in a quarrel over his illicit love affair with Susan Hayes. She is a former laboratory technician in his osteopathic hospital.

DEMONSTRATION POLICE

Corrigan was bitter in his denunciation of police investigators and other authorities who built up the murder case against Dr. Sheppard.

The defence lawyer called the inquest into Marilyn's death a "carnival" and accused the coroner's office of putting "everybody on the grill for the benefit of publicity."

As for Sheppard's July 30 arrest, when he was taken from his home at night and in manacles, Corrigan remarked:

"It almost reminds you of the old Greek days. 'And then the third degree started. If you read about this thing in a people's court in China it would raise the hair on your head. But you're hearing about
