

Radar's Accuracy Is Challenged

Two persons charged with speeding in a 40 m.p.h. zone pleaded not guilty before Magistrate Chester MacDonald yesterday, "not because of money or points off their licence," as Defence Counsel Alex Campbell said, "but as a matter of principle."

Representing Russell Thomas Hammill, Albany, and Joseph Alex Murphy, Summerside, Mr. Campbell presented a case before the magistrate suggesting that on the day the two men were charged the speed-checking radar apparatus may not have been properly operated.

Mr. Hammill was told to appear in court for travelling 53 m.p.h. and Mr. Murphy was told to appear for travelling 50 m.p.h. Both were charged in the same case on the same morning, Oct. 18.

Prof. James Dineen, electronics expert at the University of New Brunswick, was called before the magistrate by the Crown to explain the principle by which the electronic speed meter operates and to relate the conditions under which the apparatus will properly function.

To operate without error, the "radar" (as it is commonly referred to) would have to be in the direct path of the moving vehicle, Prof. Dineen said, but it being impracticable the apparatus is advantageously set up within five feet of the edge of the highway on which vehicles checked are travelling.

If set up this way, the apparatus would have an accuracy range of two per cent. This amount of error would be to the advantage of the driver of the vehicle being checked.

The electronic speed checking apparatus used by the Summerside detachment RCMP is not affected by atmospheric conditions and not affected by chains dragging on the pavement or tinsel in the hub caps, the professor said.

It was suggested that the apparatus has a safeguard against error he explained in

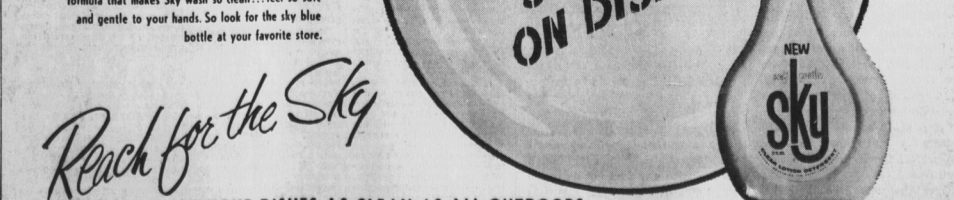
