**DELAY OF FREIGHT.**

The delay of freight on the Intercolonial Railway has become a public scandal, and suggests the reverse of business-like methods on the part of our business is business government. It is said by the Canadian Journal of Commerce that "a bullock team from Halifax could have carried freights more quickly than has been done this winter by the Intercolonial Railway," and "cases of merchandise landed from the Sardinian at Halifax nearly a month ago are still creeping along at a snail's pace on their way to Montreal." We can assure our contemporary that the progress of goods from Montreal to the Maritime Provinces is not one whit more rapid, while the charges—to P. E. Island, at least—are enormous. The Journal of Commerce declares that,—

"One reason why the Intercolonial has been run at a loss year after year, has been its defective freight service, which created a prejudice against the line. It is not merely annoying, it is a positive loss to merchants at this season, to have their goods delayed in delivery. There is no reason for such prolonged delay. The line is not overburdened with either freight or passenger traffic nor can any reason be found in snow blockades. Goods sent by other routes have been delivered in satisfactory time and in bulk, not by small instalments. There is something radically defective in the management of this government line, probably its being a government road is the secret. Whatever may be the cause, a thorough reform is urgently needed. Such outrageous delay in transmission of goods from England is a serious drawback to British trade with Canada. We invite the attention of the government to this scandal."

**LAURIER LIMNED.**

In the course of an address delivered at Quebec, a few days ago, Sir Charles Tupper said:

"I have challenged Sir Wilfrid Laurier to mention one single feature of his policy, one plank of his platform, and I will give him day and date when he trampled it under foot. (Laughter and applause.) My objection to him is that he is an opportunist. (Applause.) Let me remind you of the time that he was given his doctor's degree at Cambridge. There is a Mr. Sandys, whose duty it is to present those selected for these degrees and to explain why they are conferred upon them. When I was presented for my degree of Doctor of Laws the same as Sir Wilfrid's, Mr. Sandys was kind enough to say that here was a gentleman that had joined two oceans together. (Loud applause.) When he presented Sir Wilfrid Laurier he said "Here is a gentleman who can speak eloquently in two languages." (Laughter.) He might have added "and with equal eloquence upon both sides of a question." Roscoe Conkling, criticising the Senator from Ohio on one occasion, said that he reminded him of the tin weathercocks on the barns, and that he would be handed down to posterity not only as the greatest equestrian of his day, but also as the famous bareback rider who could ride two horses at the same time, running in different directions. No better description could be applied to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. If his government adopted a policy today they were liable to repudiate it tomorrow."

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—It is hoped that the Nova Scotia Southern Railway will be completed this year.

—The Patriot is discreetly silent concerning Mr. Wise's letter. Neither has it any explanation or apology to offer concerning its refusal to publish the letter of Mr. R. K. Bruce in reply to one of its anonymous correspondents.

—The Neueste Nachrichten publishes a despatch from St. Petersburg saying that the Russian war office, after elaborate experiments with improved quick-firing guns, has given the preference to a Russian model named after its inventor, Engelhardt. Two Russian firms have already signed contracts for supplying 1,200 of these guns.

—It is somewhat surprising, in view of Mr. Bruce's challenge to his defamers to come out over their own signatures, that The Guardian should have permitted an anonymous writer to make a personal attack upon him. This course of action may be in accord with our independent and astute contemporary's ideas of fair play. But it will not be commended by honorable men. It is well known that Mr. Bruce has not, in the past, taken an active part in politics; but it will be admitted that he has cause to be active in the future.

**PUBLIC OPINION.**

REFERRING in the course of his Quebec speech to the Canadian public opinion of the day, Sir Charles Tupper said that he could boast of having seen more of Canada during the last three months than any other man. He had visited all parts of the country from Nova Scotia to British Columbia, and had addressed fifty-seven great public meetings, which had only been limited by the capacity of the largest buildings available for them. It was by means of this extensive personal experience that he had become aware of the overwhelming change that was taking place in the public opinion throughout the Dominion. He reminded his hearers that the great Liberal-Conservative party had never yet been beaten by the Liberals. Their defeat in 1896, was due mainly to a split at the time in the ranks of the Con-
