**Robert Wins From O'Mahony**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, July 16.—Yvon Robert, 21-year old dealer, tonight defeated Danmo O'Mahony, the Irish whip artist, two out of three falls in a wrestling bout recognized by the Montreal Athletic Commission as for the world's heavyweight championship.  
The young French-Canadian gained the first fall after 24 minutes, 59 seconds of grappling. He used a rolling short-arm scissors to put the Irishman's shoulders down. O'Mahony came back after nine minutes, 37 seconds more wrestling to take the second fall with his renowned Irish whip but it took Robert only a short time to gain the third fall and the title.  
In exactly four minutes, 42 seconds, he dropped the Irishman to the canvas with a body slam and pinned him there.

**Changes Indicate Shake-up In Militia**

OTTAWA, July 16.—(CP) — The Department of National Defence today made public a long list of militia changes indicating a vigorous house-cleaning was in progress among Canada's territorial troops.  
Changes wiping out many units through disbandments and amalgamations were described as part of a plan to obtain better balance between the various arms in the non-permanent active militia. Some of the units abolished were not organized.  
Department officials declined to discuss reports the whole service was being modernized in accordance with resolutions passed last Spring by the Canadian Defence Association calling for greater mechanization, greater supplies of modern equipment and more frequent opportunities for officers to witness manoeuvres on a large scale by troops in their countries.

**MY FIRST SCOUT CAMP**

(By Mrs. F. A. Driscoll)

"The Boy Scouts are no good," said I.  
"I would accredit you Mrs. Driscoll, with having better brains," said the Chief.  
After much contemplation and consideration I decided I would spend my vacation with our most excellent Scoutmaster F. A. D. at Brudenell camp.  
On Dominion Day 1936, the Driscoll trio, Daddy, Mum and son boarded T. Eaton's truck, laden with irrefragable and hardware for the Scout, thirty-nine miles from Charlottetown.  
Passing many hayfields we inhaled the perfumed air of clover; heard the singing of the song sparrow; gazed at the planted fields, and finally a long lane at its turning brought us to our camp site. Green was made a prettier spot existing in old Nova Scotia. There is an open level field, surrounded by trees which is the dwelling place of our tents. To the left across the Brudenell River is Georgetown; to the right across the Montague River is Lower Montague.  
The scenery in the morning is equally as picturesque as in the evening. As one glances across these rivers in the morning, one sees a mirage, which is food for an artist's brush. In the evening the soft moonlight falling on the water, which is so calm and clear, and across the rivers a row-boat or motor boat containing youthful singers tells a story all its own.  
We busied ourselves the first evening making ourselves comfortable and erecting headquarters tent, cooks tent, etc. As soon to dine of an unexpected supper, prepared by an extraordinary cook. (2 Smiths, 1 Parent, 3 Driscolls).  
It was my first night under canvas—a real drama—  
"I hear thunder!"  
"Only the flap of a tent!"  
"That's the noise!"  
"Only a motor boat going for fish."  
"The ants are many."  
"Oh! they are harmless."  
"It is a hard bed."  
"Why don't you eat something and cushion the bones?"  
"Were you ever in a tent before?"  
"No only gaped into one at Aldershot."  
Finally sleep overtook us and we peacefully slumbered until morning.  
The second day brought 79 boys from Charlottetown, Summerside and Borden. We were then a family of 91, and the following day a handsome priest increased our family to 92. A tent was speedily erected for him and a "downy bed" of spruce boughs made by the disciple of St. Augustine who persists in racing the fields with a dirty face, shirt-tail out, and has never been seen licking the dishes.  
We must not lose sight of the fact that it is Friday—fish day—despiteable to most boys, but proved a day of rare menus. For dinner we had fresh codfish baked, string beans, mashed potatoes, lemon sauce, rice pudding, plum sauce, tea. For supper we had macaroni and cheese etc.  
On Saturday the big feature was the launching of the hand made raft, designed by a noble Scout, a disciple of St. Robert, and a "go-ernment engineer." Truth is, he can do more than spread fertilizer and assist grains.  
Each Scout drove a nail, even the uninitiated Scout Leonard Alphonus drove a nail "home" and stands in a prominent position with Lamer and Land on the raft. The raft was christened Brudenell Annie by Father McCordle, and was sent out with its crew to have a bath.  
Although many miles from home we had brown bread and beans for supper, and evening prayers.  
A drenching rain ended the camp fire. Prayers were said in two large tents. It rained, it lightninged, it thundered, but all slept peacefully until Scout Chief Warren blew his whistle to arise; it was the Sabbath. We had mass at 7 a.m. We ate our breakfast with our coats on. It was inspiring to see the boys receiving their communion, they making up one half the camp, the remainder being led in worship by Camp Chief Warren.

Our dinner was like that of an hotel, having boiled ham, peas, potatoes, cookies and ice cream. Not a poverty of any means. It was very cold and raining, so our most excellent cook prepared a hot soup for supper. Along with strawberries, cookies, brown and white bread, and frosted cake (pink). We had a "high tea."  
Monday morning dawned drizzling rain, but we had faith in "c-b-w" on the grass to bring a hot sunny day, which it proved to be. One has a "picked up" dinner, but not so here. We had corned beef, string beans, potatoes, raisin sponge pudding with sauce, brown bread and tea.  
Tests are being made today to obtain badges in swimming, entertaining, jumping, cooking, etc. Two lads entertained us beautifully at dinner hour by jokes, songs, etc.  
Tuesday brought us a lovely day. My companion and I made errands to Montague, one for elastic, one for shoe polish, so about the Brudenell little we packed ourselves for a ride to Montague, to which the camp car went every morning for supplies. Having admired the scenery, the winding river flowing gently through the village, the well kept homes of the inhabitants, we came to the conclusion that it was a prosperous, industrious hamlet.  
Wednesday being field day we had many visitors. A little shower cleared the air, and a brilliant sun made Camp De Roma a true haven of delight.  
Races, contests, etc., filled in the afternoon. A pretty campfire ended our week's camping. With excitement and delicacies brought from "home, sweet home," the vim was taken out of the boys and games were a great exertion to them.  
Friday brought our glorious and
