Shaw Claims Tax is Objectionable

Provincial government officials feel an abrupt halt will be called to planned building projects unless the government at Ottawa moves to eliminate the new 11 per cent tax on manufactured materials.

Premier Walter R. Shaw called the assessment "one of the worst blows this province has a had in many years." He explained that it would hit hard at the program of development undertaken in this area.

He added that the tax was particularly objectionable because it would strike its hardest at the lower and middle classes.

Resources Minister Leo Rossier was in full agreement and said that he could not understand this move by the federal government as they claimed they were trying to decrease unemployment and this tax could only have an adverse effect on the employment situation.

The chairman of the provincial housing commission explained that the tax was certainly hard on the co-operative housing developments in the province as they were limited by statute to the amount of money they could obtain under legislation and this move would use only for building materials and therefore completely taxable.

The cost per house would be increased by a substantial amount he explained. The only way to overcome the increase in repayment sums would be to extend the time allowed for payment but this would mean the owner would have to pay more for his house in the long run.

The first example of the effect on co-operative housing came last night when the Murrell project announced it would have to hold up development because of the increased cost of each home until such time as the federal government reviewed the situation and perhaps withdrew the assessment.

In general the consensus of all responsible officials is that the federal government will have to kill the tax or face a steadily mounting public irritation caused by a noticeable increase in unemployment across the country.

P.E.I. Hosp. To Sponsor 4 Nurses At University

The Board of Trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital has announced that this fall four nurses will be selected to take a diploma course at a Canadian university.

The main stipulation will be that the nurses chosen will be required to make an undertaking in that they will return to work for a specified minimum period after the hospital.

During the session, which was presided over by William Hayward, chairman of the board, Miss Barbara Pratt, director of nursing services requested that the trustees approach the Hospital Services Commission for approval to support the nurses education program offering at the University of Wales College during the coming college year.

She also asked that the swimming pool at student nurses be continued again this year at the YMCA pool. Both these requests received the approval of the board.

To improve facilities in the nurses residence, approval was given for the purchase of a washing machine and dryer for the laundry, and also for the installation of a second telephone.

It was also announced that a new riding type power lawn mower has been ordered and that progress is being made on the pruning of trees and bushes of the grounds and a general beautification of the area surrounding the hospital buildings.

The administrator, Neil MacLean, announced that Friday, June 28, a disaster institute and exercise will be held at the Charlottetown Hospital, starting at 10 a.m. and at 7 p.m. the same day a disaster exercise will be held at the P.E.I. Hospital.
