### Cayuga Aided In Evacuation Of Inchon

OTTAWA, Jan. 8—(CP)—The navy reported Saturday the Canadian destroyer Cayuga participated in the evacuation of Inchon Thursday and released a colorful account of the flaming sights her sailors saw.

This latest role for the Canadian destroyers in Korean waters came a little less than four months after the Cayuga, Sioux and Athabaskan participated in the spectacular United Nations landing at Inchon.

This time Cayuga was part of a Commonwealth task force assigned to escort fuel and supply ships out of the harbor and get them started on their way to bases farther south.

The navy said there was no mass evacuation of troops by sea but supply, hospital, fuel and ammunition ships of the U.N. logistics

command on the west coast were involved.

There were also hundreds of small barges, motor vessels and junks with patched sails, all loaded to the gunwales with Korean refugees leaving the area.

Officers and men of Cayuga got a grandstand view of the scene Thursday night as the ships moved out of the harbor and demolition and bombardment began.

Lieut. Andrew Collier of Salmon Arm, B.C., told of "hordes of junks and small craft streaming out of the harbor... their port and starboard lights dotted the night like lights on a Christmas tree."

Cayuga completed one escort job at nightfall and returned to the harbor. As she entered the port the men on watch saw the devastating effects of demolition on facilities ashore.

The U.S.S. Rochester, American heavy cruiser, lay close inshore and directed her fire beyond the city at the road leading from Seoul to Inchon. Shells from her guns traced fiery arcs in the black sky as round after round was lobbed a distance of some 10 miles.

In Inchon itself, army engineers blew up port facilities, communication lines and supply dumps.

### Upward Trend For CN Telegraph Service

MONCTON, Jan. 8— "Our telegraph message business in the Maritime Provinces during the past year shows an increase of six per cent in revenues," Hugh A. Marquis, superintendent Canadian National Telegraphs has announced.

Referring to the trends for 1951 Mr. Marquis stated that he was looking forward to an increase in telegraph business with the speeding up of industry on account of Canada's defence programme.

"A feature of our telegraph business Mr. Marquis continued is the increasing use of teletype by commercial firms; it has been found by business firms that the use of the teletype makes for greater economy and efficiency in their operations also that their inventories can be reduced. In some cases several branch offices are linked together by teletype and this provides for instantaneous communications between the various branches and the interchange of stocks.

"Heavy expenditures have been experienced throughout the year," Mr. Marquis stated due to severe storms. Communication companies have experienced great difficulty throughout the Maritimes during the past few weeks due to the recent heavy snow storm; this called for emergency efforts to reestablish communications with a minimum of delay, construction crews working throughout the Christmas holidays.

Various improvements have been made in our telegraph communication facilities and these improvements will be continued throughout the coming year. New facilities include the addition of carrier current circuits which provide for the sending of several messages over the same wire and new types of poles insulators. The use of creosote treatment has greatly extended the life of telegraph poles making for greater economy and the work of substituting the present with creosoted poles will be continued throughout the year."

There was an awkward silence.

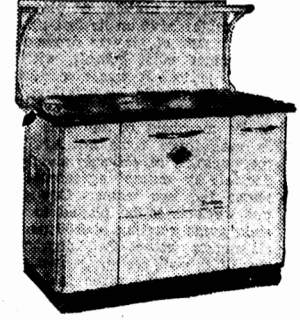
"What is it?" asked Sheila, coming up the steps.
