A CORRESPONDENT at East Point, writing on the 14th inst., says:—"There was quite an unusual display of lightning in this vicinity last evening, the like of which is seldom witnessed this time of the year. After an unusual heavy flash the barn belonging to Mr. Paul J. McDonald was discovered to be on fire, which, together with contents, was totally consumed; and it was with the utmost exertion that his dwelling house was saved."

THE Halifax Herald reports that C. R. Tuttle, Secretary of the Hudson's Bay Expedition, has written for publication a complete and most exhaustive work, the result of observation and research, entitled "The New North." It will be put in the printer's hands immediately, and placed before the public with Mr. Tuttle's characteristic energy. The work will be profusely illustrated with steel engravings, and will be of very great interest, in view of the future of that route of traffic.

THE New York Herald heads the publication of the statement of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the last fiscal year with the line, "A good showing as the result of Lord Lansdowne's administration of the government." This is a curious mistake for the Herald to make. It ought at least to know enough of the constitutional system of Canada to be aware of the fact that the Governor-General has about as much to do with the revenue and expenditure of this country as has the President of the United States.

English Politics.

LONDON, Oct. 15.
Charles Dilke, in a speech delivered yesterday at Oldham, said that if the Tories would propose a reasonable redistribution scheme the Government would be found anxious to meet them.
At a Conservative meeting held yesterday at Wymbe, the Liberals were found to be in the ascendancy, and much disorder prevailed, ending in the Liberals putting a motion endorsing Gladstone, which was carried.

Presbyterian Synod.

PICTOR, N. S., Oct. 15.
The Synod of the Maritime Provinces in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, was opened last evening in Knox Church, there being some 230 members present.
The opening services were conducted by the retiring Moderator, Rev. Dr. Burns, of Fort Massey Church, Halifax, who preached an able and eloquent sermon.

International Conferences.

PARIS, Oct. 15.
The Memorial Diplomatique states that Queen Victoria has requested Premier Gladstone to submit to the Cabinet for their consideration the question whether special power cannot be conferred on the Prince of Wales to enable him to participate in conferences of the sovereigns of Europe.

A Brilliant Engagement.

PARIS, Oct. 15.
Gen. De' Lisle telegraphs from Chu, under date of Monday, as follows:—"Col. Donnier, after a brilliant engagement on Friday, carried the heights commanding the fortress of Chu. The Chinese force was very large. The Chinese loss was 3,000 killed. The French loss was twenty killed and ninety wounded."

Professor Thomas Henry Huxley is unwell, and his physicians order absolute rest.

Joining Osman Digma.

CAIRO, Oct. 15.
A despatch from Suddim states that Amatar tribes have joined Osman Digma.

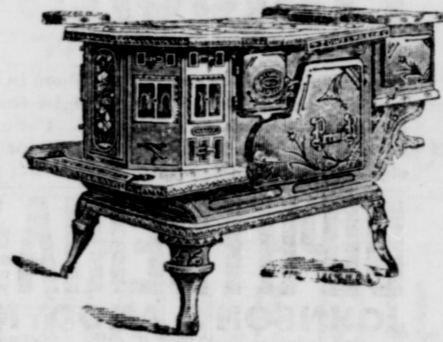
