At Johannesburg and Pretoria—
Hopes to be at Home Soon.

June 1, 1900.

MY DEAR MR. JAMES.—Just a word. Our convoy returning. We have Johannesburg. Our brigade has had a fearful fight, but so far as we can learn it is practically in the end of the war. The Islanders with us, very few in number, are in good health. Weeks is here all right again. He joined us today. The convoy is about to go, so I must close. Glad to hear the sick ones are better. I shall soon return now.

MY DEAR MR. JAMES.—It is some time since we had an opportunity of writing. You know, however, by this time that Pretoria has fallen and that we played our part in the matter. For us the war is practically over, and no matter what may ensue I shall leave for home on the first possible opportunity now.

The difficulty just now is getting back to Cape Town, but as soon as the line is open I shall begin my return journey. I was weighed the other day and discovered to my great surprise that I was only 135 lbs. I must have lost something like 39 lbs. on the trip. Still I ought not to be surprised as the fatigue, hardship and tension have at times been beyond all description. However you will hear it all, I hope, bye and bye.

We have had no mails for nearly two months, and have just heard that they were captured and destroyed. Weeks, McDonald and I spent a day in Pretoria. I may say we are all in good health. Hedley and Brace are both with the regiment. Lord is at Naauwpoort, I believe. I don't know when I may get this off, but trust soon. Hope the Kirk is doing well. With kind regards to all.

Mr. Dillon was sent to a Dutch hospital concerning which he speaks in the highest terms and was attended by a Dutch nurse whom he describes as an angel. With him in the hospital were Messrs. Redd and Cook, both ill of enteric fever. All were happily recovered. Mr. Dillon had, during the course of the campaign, been shot in the hand, but the wound was well and he was on duty when he wrote.

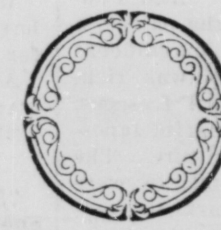
