HOTEL SOLD.—The Vendome Hotel, at New Glasgow, N. S., has been sold to Mr. Thomas Beach, of Bedford.

POLICE COURT.—Robert Kent was fined \$1 without costs for drunkenness, and a Scott Act case was postponed.

A FEW LEFT.—The Dominion Illustrated, with the lawn tennis tournament group, are at the Diamond Bookstore.

TO INCREASE ITS CAPITAL.—It is said that the Merchants Bank of Halifax intends increasing its capital by \$100,000.

ISLAND PRODUCE.—The Herald says that Island potatoes retail in Halifax at 44 cts.; turnips 32 cts.; oats 40 to 42 cts. per bushel.

CONFIRMATION.—One hundred and sixty candidates were confirmed by Archbishop O'Brien, in St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax, on Sunday last.

RARE CHANCE.—A valuable building lot on the corner of Great George and Kent Streets, (known as the McDonnell property) will be offered at auction to-morrow at noon.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.—The St. John city council has called tenders for 100 new electric lights. The Council is also considering the propriety of the city owning and operating its own electric lighting plant.

THE OSBORNE HOUSE.—The Osborne House was offered at auction by Mr. Bearsto at noon to-day. The highest bid was \$9,300. The appraisement of the court being above that amount, the property was not sold.

SMALLPOX IN BOSTON.—Advices from Boston are to the effect that three cases of smallpox—the first in three years—have been discovered in the family of an Italian living in that city. A young man and two young women have the disease, while two children display its symptoms. There are seven or eight other families in the house and it is feared other cases will be disclosed.

GOT THEIR DESERTS.—An Anahorst despatch says that James Campbell and Michael Brophy, the burglars, received their sentences on Saturday morning at the hands of Judge Morse. Campbell was given 10 years in Dorchester for the McLeod jewelry burglary, six years for the Mattinson burglary at Thompson, and four years for the horse stealing, in all 20 years. Brophy was given four years for complicity in the jewelry theft.

STREET RAILWAY.—The Halifax Street Railway has been purchased by a Nova Scotia syndicate. The railway has been very successful since its inception. The first year's operations showed that the road carried 900,000 passengers, the second year between 1,000,000 and 1,100,000, now approaching the close of the third year, the total number of passengers will exceed 1,200,000. Large extensions will be made. The service will be made 5 minutes instead of 7 and the cars will be run by electricity.

ANOTHER RECORD BREAKER.—The trots at Lexington, Ky., closed on Saturday. Edgemark got a record of 2.16 in the afternoon for the fastest four-year-old stallion record. In the first race, unfinished from the previous day, 2.40 class, Jean Valjean won, with Coast Bay second and Limestone third. Time, 2.27 1/2, 2.24 1/2, 2.25 1/2. The second race, futurity stake for three-year-olds, was a walk over for Palo Alto; best time 2.22. The third race—2.19 class—Hourie won, with Hendryx second and Kileury third; time, 2.18 1/2, 2.17, 2.18. In the steeplechase, 2.30 class, Acolyte won with Bonnie Wilmore second and Guelph third; time, 2.23, 2.24 1/2, 2.21 1/2.

A MIGHTY HUNTER.—Last autumn Mr. Goulding Smith, son of Johathan Smith, Esq., of Kingston, Lot 31, noticed a couple of hawks which had lit upon a large tree, quite early in the morning. The next morning he went down and waited for them. Presently they came along and he shot one then, and the other next day. A few days ago he saw another hawk on the same tree and went down to watch him, and while there, along comes a fox, walking on the fence, and he shot him dead, breaking two of his legs. Last Wednesday, Oct. 16, he heard the geese making quite a noise. On looking out he saw a fox sneaking around the barn, and hastily running out, shot the fox dead.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The International Marine Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.

When Admiral Franklin called the International Marine Conference to order this morning, there were but a few vacant chairs around the conference table. He announced that the duties of the committee on lights and sound signals are to prepare all the available literature in the subjects of lights and sound signals in shape to be easily considered by the conference. A resolution was proposed by Goodrich that the sense of the conference is, there shall be no change in the masthead and colored lights as at present used. This was carried unanimously. It was the first definite vote taken by the conference on any proposition presented. Recess was taken after some talk about the definition of terms.

A Dangerous Wreck.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., Oct. 21.

Captain Angrove, of the steamer St. Pierre, from St. Pierre, Mig., reports visiting the wreck of the ship Minnie Swift, at 7 a. m., on October 20th, and found her a most dangerous obstruction to navigation in latitude 46.15 north, and longitude 56.47 west, right in the track of vessels bound to and from the Gulf of St. Lawrence. She is standing or floating on end, stern up, and projecting about 15 feet out of the water. All the stern post is in view. The lower half of the rudder blade is newly broken off and there is a large hole in her starboard counter as if some vessel had lately been in collision with her. The wreck must be anchored as it has not changed position for the last fourteen days.

A Murderer of Princes.

BERLIN, Oct. 21.

Klaiber, who attempted to assassinate Prince William of Wurtemberg yesterday, was examined by physicians, who pronounced him sane. He is a member of a secret society, the members of which are sworn to kill all princes. The society recently drew lots to decide who should kill Prince William, and the choice fell upon Klaiber.

Threatened Water Famine.

MONCTON, Oct. 21.

If rain does not soon come Moncton will suffer from a water famine, as the reservoir which supplies the town is completely dry. The situation from a sanitary standpoint in town is not gratifying. Water for domestic use is being brought, in many cases, from surrounding wells and springs. Some factories have to shut down in consequence of no water.

Cattle Starving.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 21.

Advices from Western Montana say that thousands of heads of cattle have been starved to death from want of grass and water. Ranchmen are paying as high as twenty-five dollars for hay and in a week or two it will be impossible to get it at any price. Water is being hauled in some cases a distance of twenty miles.

The Negro Question.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.

Rev. W. B. Johnson, colored, of the Second Baptist Church, preached a sermon yesterday in which he likened the negro to Samson, who, if undisturbed, will do no harm, but if stirred up may grasp the pillars of our civilization and, like Samson of old, in his death pull down the temple of liberty.

They Fasted and Prayed.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.

The colored people of this city filled to overflowing yesterday the different churches which they attended, and passed the day in fasting and prayer to the Almighty to relieve the colored people of the South from oppression and wrong.

Senator Turner, of Hamilton, died this morning. Wm. F. Powell, formerly M. P. for Carleton, and more recently Sheriff of the same County, died here this morning, aged 64 years.

It is said that the Dominion Government have been notified that it is the intention of the British and American Governments to refer the Behring's Sea dispute to an international tribunal.
