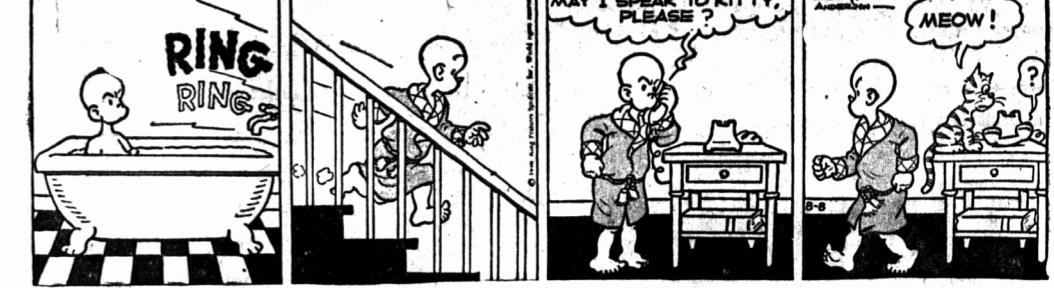

CONTRACT BRIDGE

The best available. Was he a victim of bad luck or bad planning?

South had a better method of play that was virtually certain to make the contract. After winning the king of spades, he should play the king of diamonds. As soon as both opponents follow suit, nine tricks become certain. How the diamonds break becomes only an academic question.

A low diamond is then led towards dummy's A-9. If West plays the seven, the nine is played from dummy. This assures four diamond tricks whenever the nine loses to the ten or queen, because a 3-2 diamond break becomes established. If East shows out of diamonds, meaning the suit has divided 4-1, the ace of diamonds is cashed, declarer enters his hand with a club, and returns a diamond to build up his fourth diamond trick.

If it turns out that East has Q-10-x-x in diamonds, West will show out on the second diamond play. In that case, declarer goes up with the ace and leads a third round of diamonds toward his jack again, creating four diamond tricks. In the actual hand, West cannot foil declarer by playing his ten of diamonds on the second round because in such case only the queen can take a trick.

From every angle, therefore, the best way to tackle diamonds is to lead the king first. The king can do no wrong.

South won the spade lead with the king and played a diamond to the ace. A diamond back, on which East discarded a spade, revealed there was no future in the diamond suit. Declarer, who had started with seven immediate winners, next tried his luck in hearts, leading the ace and jack.

West took his king and returned a spade to establish three spade winners. The heart queen was cashed, East following suit but not West. Declarer was now out of ammunition and had to go down one. Bad Luck had dogged him in both red suits. The question, from the standpoint of analysis, is whether South's line of play was

Electoral Campaign In Quebec Strongly Scored

QUEBEC (CP) — A wave of "stupidity and immorality" swept Quebec province during the June 20 provincial election campaign, two Laval University professors said in a study published today.

They said the reason they prepared the paper is that it is "urgent" in Quebec province to start a program of moral and civic education among Roman Catholic residents.

"Work must get under way before demagogues and fascist apprentices bestialize the masses to a point where any improvement will become impossible," the paper said.

The exact nature of the document was not immediately known although it was reported to have been circulated among members of the Quebec Roman Catholic clergy. It was not believed to have the status of an official Quebec church document.

The names of the authors were not published, presumably at their own request. Neither could be immediately reached for comment.

A sweeping condemnation of Quebec electoral campaign methods is contained in the study which accuses politicians of:

1. Waving the red flag of Communism in the recent campaign.
2. Buying votes, corrupting election officers and using violence.
3. Raising the method of using myths and lies into an electoral campaign.
