Permanent Ban Being Sought On Exports To Sino-Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States administration has asked Congress for a permanent authority to prohibit shipment of strategic materials to Sino-Soviet bloc countries. Dr. Jack N. Behrman, assistant commerce secretary for international affairs, told the Senate banking committee that the world outlook is so uncertain there is no doubt controls will be necessary for the foreseeable future. He asked a permanent extension of the Export Control Act, which expires June 30, asserting that the customary two-year extensions place U.S. negotiators under a handicap when they try to persuade Western allies to clamp tighter controls on shipments behind the Iron Curtain. Behrman said there is a real possibility these efforts now under way at Paris "may be impaired in the eyes of at least some of our allies," coming on the eve of the expiration of the act this year. Behrman ran into sharp questioning from Senator Homer E. Capehart (Rep. Ind.) as to why the United States permits any trade at all with Russia and other Communist countries and helps other Western nations which carry on extensive trade with Red nations. "We spend billions and billions of dollars fighting communism—we have our boys in Viet Nam today—we have the Cuban situation and the Berlin situa-

countries, but would create world-wide prosperity. Today's shrunken world cannot continue to exist half prosperous and half starved. Mr. Bronfman said. "This is not even the world of 1952 or 1942, to say nothing of the turn of the century. The peoples of the 'have-not' countries have suddenly come to life—they awake from almost a sleep of centuries and realize that part of the world lives on a high standard of living and a greater part on a low standard, while the greatest part is on a starvation standard. Mr. Bronfman's comments were contained in a text made available to the press in advance of delivery.

Breweries Head Suggests Plan For Pooling Aid
TORONTO (CP)—An international plan to help the underdeveloped countries of the world was urged here by Samuel Bronfman, of Montreal, in an address to the Canadian Club. He suggested that the "have" countries pool their huge resources of capital, skills, experience and management into a great organization. He added: "A plan whereby the 'have' countries would create a council of statesmen, bankers, engineers, scientists, economists, industrialists, to catalogue each nation's needs and provide a pool of talent and resources to plan for their priority development problems, would be of such far-reaching consequences as to be of a revolutionary character."
