Some Sidelight Of The CPR Strike Across The Nation

MONTREAL (CP) — A freight train with an engineer and a fireman aboard its three-unit diesel pulled out of the giant CPR marshalling yards in Montreal's Cote St. Luc district at 6:01 a.m. EST., one minute after the start of the firemen's strike. Subsequent freights left the yards without firemen. Seven yard diesels operated without firemen.

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto—a city with a reputation for being quiet on Sunday—maintained its usual calm at the outset of the firemen's strike. Twenty minutes after the strike started no one had turned up to picket Union Station.

HALIFAX (CP)—Two provinces—Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island—were unaffected by the firemen's strike. Both are served exclusively by the publicly owned Canadian National Railways.

REGINA (CP)—A CPR official from Regina, wearing a sports coat and tie, was in the fireman's place when train No. 2, The Canadian, arrived at 11:25 a.m. ADT. A CPR spokesman declined to give the official's name but said he boarded the train at Moose Jaw to replace the regular fireman. The Canadian was travelling about 4 1/2 hours late due to slides in the Rockies.

EDMONTON (CP)—Many engineers were reported unavailable for work by booking in as unfit for duty. A railway spokesman said scheduled operations were unaffected. It was learned railway officials were prepared to substitute for any firemen who refused to cross picket lines to work on passenger trains.

WINNIPEG (CP)—Roy McCaldin, senior vice-president of the firemen's union for the western region of Canadian National Railways, said off-duty CNR firemen will help man picket lines at western terminal points.

Attends School Superintendents Short Course

Mr. Louis F. Herring, Supervisor of Schools and Mrs. Herring left for Toronto by car Thursday and expect to return June 3. He is one of 70 educationists from Canada's ten provinces meeting at the University of Toronto for three weeks beginning May 12 to study problems of educational leadership in local communities. He has been selected as a member of a short course for school superintendents and inspectors offered by the Canadian Education Association in conjunction with the Ontario College of Education.

Forty-seven of the seventy are superintendents or inspectors from predominantly rural areas, selected by Departments of education of the various provinces. Twelve are city superintendents, employees of local school boards. Teacher, trustee and parent points of view will be assured by the inclusion of three appointees of the Canadian Teachers' Federation, two of the Canadian School Trustees' Association and one of the Canadian School Trustees' Association and one of the Canadian Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation. Additional places have been allotted to a Superintendent of Schools from the Northwest Territories, and a Regional Inspector of Indian Schools from Manitoba.

Award Contract For Red Head Retaining Wall

The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$32,925.00 to Edward MacCallum, Contractor, of Brackley Beach, P. E. I., for the construction of a retaining wall at Red Head, P. E. I. Specified completion date for this project is March 7, 1959.

Work will consist of tied back creosoted pile bents spaced at 8 feet centres with wales and bracing. Four thousand-eight hundred square feet of timber-concrete composite deck and 2,300 cubic yards of rock and clay backfill is required to complete this structure.

Upon completion the overall length of the retaining wall will be 420 feet.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works in Ottawa.
