The Elections in Ireland. LONDON, June 18.—It is said that Gladstone, Morley and Schudhorst have resumed their efforts to prevent the Parnellites and McCarthyites from putting up opposing candidates in close constituencies where Unionist candidates are likely to be benefited.

Capt Stairs May Not be Dead. The family of Captain Stairs have been unable to get any news confirmatory of his death, and they hope that the report may eventually turn out to have been incorrect. They have received no information to convince them that Captain Stairs met death in the manner stated in the despatches that have been published in any other way.—Hfx Chronicle.

A Temperance Lecture. As the steamship Augerton, on Sunday, was passing Lanorata, on her way to Perreville, P. Q., David O'Donnell, who was under the influence of liquor, fell overboard and was drowned. When the Augerton left Montreal, it was noticed that a number of passengers were under the influence of liquor.

A Dominion Reformatory. OTTAWA, June 16.—W. H. Howland, president of the prison reform association of Toronto, interviewed Sir John Thompson today and advocated the establishment by the dominion of a reformatory for young men, and also the institution of a system of probationary sentences. Sir John expressed himself gratified to receive representations from the association.

Who was the Member? Canada Presbyterian: A man is never in a much worse position than when he has to defend his conduct by saying that he was drunk. Still for the sake of our country we could hope that the member of the Dominion parliament who sang "Nearer My God to Thee" during the recent all-night sitting was under the influence of liquor. Such blasphemous shocks everybody of good taste, not to speak of christianity, but there are worse people in the Dominion than the legislator who thus outraged common decency. We mean the electors who send such men to parliament.

A Message from the Pope.

VIENNA, June 15.—A despatch from Rome says: "The pope has enjoined Archbishop Vaughan, of Westminster, England, to avoid mixing up in party strife, and especially not to oppose Irish-national aspirations."

Lobsters for England. A recent shipment of 2200 lobsters to London resulted in 1100 of them being landed there alive, the balance did not survive the heat of the Gulf Stream. This will be guarded against on another shipment by a good supply of ice. On a glutted market they brought 18 and 20 cents each.

To Evangelize the Chinese. TORONTO, June 16.—At the missionary service in connection with the annual session of the synod of the diocese of Toronto, the bishop of Toronto announced that the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions had resolved to take up the evangelization of the Chinese on the Pacific coast, and had also determined to make a special effort on behalf of pagan Indians in the Northwest.

Blocked With Field Ice. FATHER POINT, Quebec, June 16.—Steamship Baumwell, of the Hamburg and American Packet Co., which passed inward last night, tried the straits of Belle Isle but found the entrance completely blocked by heavy field ice. The Cremona of the same line, was the first vessel to pass through the straits last year. The prevalence of easterly winds all spring is the cause of the passage being still blocked with ice.

Spoiled His Wedding Tour. OTTAWA, June 16.—A peculiar accident happened to Fred Lamplough, train despatcher of the Canada Atlantic railway, yesterday. He was married in the morning to Miss Sadie Wilkins, and the couple started for Montreal. At Alexandria station the train hands exploded some fog signals in Lamplough's honor. A fragment of a signal struck him on the leg, inflicting a dangerous wound and necessitating his being sent to the Montreal hospital.

A Question of Etiquette. The other day a French officer paid the warship Blake a visit. In a boat alongside the Blake, when the French officer arrived, was sitting a middy belonging to the Blake. The latter stood up in the boat and saluted the officer. He evidently did what was wrong. It was right for him to salute the French officer, but he had no right to leave his seat. According to naval rules he overstepped the mark in standing. As a punishment for the offence his leave has been stopped for some days.—Halifax Mail.

Count Mercier's Creditors. MONTREAL, June 15.—A meeting of Count Mercier's creditors took place today, when the official list of liabilities amounting to \$61,900 was presented, with the following statement of assets: Tourover property \$25,000. St. Dennis Street house 15,000. Quebec residence 6,000. St. Hyacinthe property 3,500. Phosphate lands 1,250. Island at St. Rose 300. Other assets 5,000. Total \$50,000. Those, however, are fancy figures, and would not realize half that amount if sold tomorrow. It was decided to avail an offer from the ex-premier.

Church Dedication.

The people were delighted to hear him again, and are also to be congratulated on the completion of their church, which is a credit to them. The collections were very good.

District Division No. 2.
