

**CHRISTIAN CHURCHES.**

**Meeting of the Association at Southport.**

The Prince Edward Island Association of Christian Churches assembled in convention at Southport from July 7th to 9th inclusive. The association opened under the most auspicious circumstances, and the interest and enthusiasm continued throughout. Rev. F. Harlow, of Summerside, preached Saturday night. The rev. gentleman is the new pastor at Summerside. Rev. D. Crawford, of New Glasgow, the pioneer preacher of the Christian Church on the Island, delivered the Associational sermon on Sunday morning, and Rev. I. Nelson Stevenson, of Ontario, who arrived Friday to take charge of the work at Montague, was the speaker of Sunday evening. At the business meeting on Monday Rev. R. F. Whiston was unanimously elected moderator, and J. Harry Williams secretary of the association. A mission board was constituted to be called the Home Mission Board of P. E. I. The members elected were Rev. J. Nelson Stevenson, A. N. Simpson and Major Linkletter, of Summerside; Harry Williams was appointed missionary secretary and Francis Boyer, treasurer. The committees on Temperance, Ways and Means, Obituaries and resolutions gave full and excellent reports, showing the work to be in a prosperous and promising condition. Resolutions were adopted thanking the Press, the people of Southport and the P. E. I. Railway for courtesies conferred. The farewell meeting was last night and was a fitting close to a most helpful and inspiring Association. Rev. R. F. Whiston gave a rousing address upon the "God Sent Man," which will be long remembered. About 125 delegates were in attendance and many visitors. The church was crowded at all services. The next Association will be held with the Central Christian Church at Charlottetown.

**MR. McLEAN'S LETTER.**

Mr. T. A. McLEAN's reply to the Patriot is very much to the point. Really the Patriot ought not to have given credence to the statement of one of the Government's paid heeblers as against that of a man of the character and standing of Mr. McLean. Mr. McLean was perfectly right and reasonable when he said that but four to six carts could be used to advantage upon the three chains of narrow roadway under repair at Newson's hill. It is admitted that as many as twelve carts were upon the ground at the public expense, and it is again asserted by Mr. McLean that no less than sixteen were hired on the part of the Government. Outrageous unjustifiable, as this is, it is not at all extraordinary. To secure the election of Dr. Douglass electors, right and left, have been bribed with the people's money, which has, in great part, been literally thrown away not only at Newson's Hill but in many other parts, of the Second District of Queen's.

As to Mr. McLean's direct charge of the attempted bribery of his farmers—we shall see whether or not the Patriot will dare to deny it.

**A Very Interesting Celebration at Cavendish Yesterday.**
