IN MEMORIAM

JOHN S. MACKAY
The death of John S. MacKay of Stanley Bridge occurred on May 7 under tragic circumstances. He was employed by the postal department to deliver mail in the Breadalbane area and while he was enroute to the post office to pick up his mail, some making the horse bolt and throwing Mr. MacKay to the ground causing his death.

John Sutherland MacKay was born at Hamilton, P.E.I., the son of the late Kenneth MacKay and his wife, Melinda Jane Cobb. When very young, he moved with his parents to Margate where he spent his boyhood days and where he is still kindly remembered. He was three other sons, Wallace, Daniel and Rudolph. A twin sister of Mr. MacKay died in infancy. The only one now living is Rudolph of Kingston, Ontario who was able to be present at the funeral.

Mr. MacKay, who was in his seventy-second year at the time of his death, was widely known. He was a man for whom the meaning of life seemed clear and he was never one to become lost in doubts or despair or become entangled in the intricacies of speculation. For him life was the present and its purpose to do what the day brought forth. He lived without sham or pretense extending the hearty hand-shake to all who came to his door and each one who passed his threshold was invited to sit at his ever hospitable table, in which he was supported by his good wife.

It is most certainly true that he was a good neighbor to which folks along his mail route can testify. He was ever ready to fetch small parcels and messages and do little turns to oblige far beyond his call of duty. And despite snow storms or muddy roads his patrons always found him cheerful and reassuring. He always left the impression that his attention was fully turned upon their particular problem.

Many who knew him best will remember his humor which had a way of expressing his common sense. He was quick to see a joke and had a way of making a quick and unexpected reply.

Perhaps his particular loves were children and horses. All children were precious to him and his loss is particularly felt among-

at his growing family of grandchildren. All his life he loved horses. They were to him friends to be cared for and cherished and it is ironic that through the fright of such a one he should have lost his life.

He leaves to mourn his wife, the former Myrtle Cole, five sons and three daughters. The sons are, Rev. Lorne of Hamilton, Ont., Don of Avon, Connecticut, Wendall of Mt. Allison University, Sackville, Kenneth of Stanley Bridge and Duncan of Hunter River, Mary, Mrs. Vernon Ferguson of Grahams Road and Lois, Mrs. John Campbell of Grahams Road. 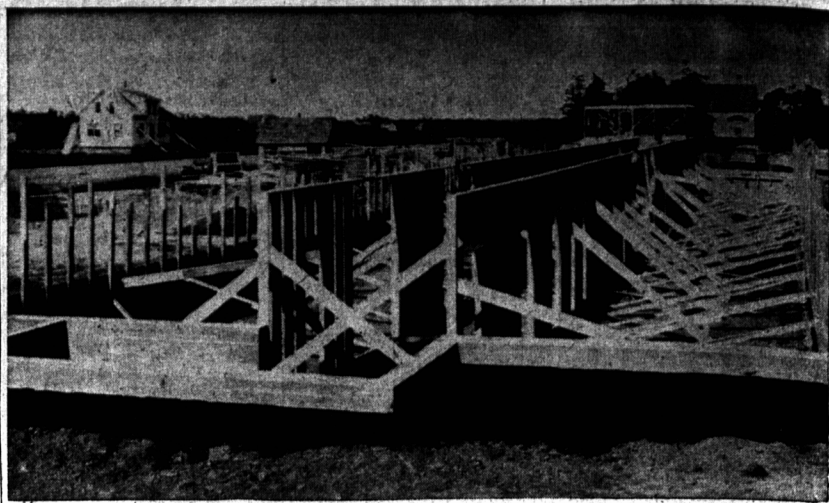
The many friends of Inkerman and vicinity are sorry to learn that Joseph Smith of Kelly's Cross lost his house by fire.

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BUILDING BOOM IN O'LEARY

A number of new modern buildings are presently under construction in the thriving village of O'Leary. Besides the new \$90,000 hospital, shown above in the first stages, and to be known as the Community Hospital, there are also under construction, a \$40,000 Federal building, a United Baptist

Church and four private homes. In the background in the picture above can be seen a new house being built by Dr. Charles Dewar. The excavation for the basement of the Federal building has been started and the work of building is expected to be started shortly.
