HANLAN-TRICKETT RACE

Hanlan Wins With Ease and is Champion of the World.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

In the race to day between Hanlan and Trickett, Hanlan led from the start. He waited for Trickett to catch up several times, and beat him with ease. Time not given. At the finish Hanlan was four lengths ahead.

FIRE RAGING IN THE MINE!

An Idea of the Conflagration & Ruin MONEY WANTED!

Special Despatch to Examiner.

STELLARTON, Nov. 14.

Coroner Murray, of New Glasgow, at the request of the Inspector of Mines, on Saturday, consented to hold an inquest on the remains of Angus McGl vray.

The body was identified and cause of death ascertained, when the inquest was adjourned till Wednesday.

An appeal for help has been made. Fully twenty thousand dollars are wanted.

The outlook for the winter months is a black one. Not only are there over forty fatherless families to support, but three hundred men have been thrown out of employment for the next six months.

The loss of property is roughly estimated at \$100,000, but if the fire is not got under it will quickly roll to a million.

Thirty-six horses were killed. It will take three months to flood the pit, perhaps more.

To realize the situation here imagine that a section of your city two and a half miles long and half-mile wide, from a quarter to a half-mile under ground, with hundreds of streets and alleyways, was on fire; then think that that section is built of coal and that a fire is raging in the various streets and will rise to an unknown extent, fed by continual explosions of gas, and that actually forty-five men have been killed and their bodies by this time cremated.

A strong call must be made to the charitable for assistance.

LONDON, Nov. 13.

Lord Beaconsfield's new novel, 'Endymion' will be published towards the end of this month. It has been reported and believed that Mr. Gladstone was to figure largely in its pages.

The steamer *Prince Edward* arrived at Liverpool from Montreal on the 13th inst., 14 days' passage, carrying a deck load of cattle. A hundred and ten were shipped, two of which died on the passage. This is the fourth cargo of live stock the *Prince Edward* has carried this season—three from Montreal and one from Charlottetown—and she did not lose one overboard. This speaks well for her as a good sea boat.
