Extremely interested in the sport of horse racing he was visiting with one of his Borden neighbors at the Summerside Raceway. While having breakfast at the track on Saturday morning he suffered a sudden heart attack necessitating his removal to Prince County Hospital by ambulance. His condition became steadily worse and he passed away about 3 p.m. Born at French River, the late Mr. Pickering moved to Borden more than 20 years ago where he was employed on the car ferry until his retirement a few years ago. He is survived by his wife, the former Bessie Underhill, of French River, and by two sons, Elwood and Willard, and one daughter, Reta, Mrs. Preston Darnley, all of Borden. MISSING TIGNISH FISHING BOAT SPOTTED YESTERDAY BY PLANES

A Tignish fishing boat with a crew of two which failed to return to port Saturday was spotted yesterday about noon by airplanes. Claude Gavin and John Gallant who were fishing their lobster gear off the ledge at North Cape nine miles off shore became stranded when their engine broke down Saturday evening. The dense fog which enveloped the sea made it impossible for other boats to notice any signal of distress and it was not until late Saturday night that those on shore realized that one boat was still at sea. Early Sunday morning boats from Tignish run and the fishery patrol boats became engaged in a search but fog hindered their efforts. When the plane sighted the missing craft contact was made by radio with the patrol boats which soon rescued the two men and their boat which had been riding at anchor for more than eighteen hours. The men except for being very cold and hungry were otherwise the worse for their night's experience.

Bandits Shake Off Pursuit By 15 Police Cars

MONTREAL (CP)—Two armed men who escaped with an estimated \$2,200 from two branches of La Banque Provinciale du Canada Thursday were believed to have shaken off police pursuit 25 miles west of Montreal. The holdups occurred within an hour of each other at the villages of St. Philippe D'Argenteuil and St. Augustin. About 15 provincial police radio cruisers took up the chase when notified by residents of St. Augustin who took the number of the bandits' dark blue car as it sped from the village. Police said the car was stolen from a Montreal parking lot. One police car reported it was less than a mile from the bandits' car at the conclusion of the chase at a cross-road. Road blocks were set up at other points and police were posted at all bridges leading to the island of Montreal. FORCED TO FLOOR At St. Philippe the two armed men, one of them described as a red-head, forced bank manager Adrien Rochon and his wife to lie on the floor while they took \$1,200 from the bank vault. The bank is in the Rochon home. Two men answering the same description forced three customers and the woman manager of the St. Augustin branch to lie down while they stole \$1,000 and fled. Witnesses at both robberies said the men spoke French to their victims, but English between themselves. A farmer who took up the chase in his pickup truck was flagged down by provincial police for speeding. The police car itself joined the chase after the farmer explained things.
