The big Liner Wrecks one of Her Shafts.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The American line steamer St. Paul limped into his port yesterday under her port engine, having incurred the most serious experience in her career.

On Oct. 31, the St. Paul struck, as supposed, a submerged wreck which carried away her starboard propeller, causing the engines to race so fiercely that the shaft broke and all connections were snapped. The starboard engines were so severely wrecked that they were useless, and it will take six months to replace them with a new set. The ship is leaking considerably.

When the accident occurred the cabin passengers were excited, but they were soon restored to quiet by the prompt assurance that the steamer was in no danger.

**IN NOVA SCOTIA.**

Probable That Six Counties Will be Redeemed.

Election day will change this so as to very much more than give the larger figures mentioned to the Conservatives, and what is left to Grits. There is not a county held by the Conservatives that can be said to be in danger, whereas the chances are strong that six counties now held by Grits will be redeemed.

**THE GRAND FALLS DEAL.**

The story of the withdrawal of Mr. Richards in Victoria and Madawaska is a story of black treachery. No defence or palliation is possible. We may suppose that this treason was not committed without its price, but whatever the reward may be, the fact is that Mr. Richards has betrayed his friends and supporters, his party, and what is worse, has betrayed the electors of his constituency. The transaction was evidently the fruit of a deliberate conspiracy. Every precaution was taken to cheat the electors out of their right to choose their representative. If the conservatives had known of the plot they would have chosen another candidate and thus given the people a chance. If the honest liberals had known they would have prevented the crime. If the body of electors had known that they had been brought to bogus hustings to see a sham performance, and that the whole matter had been decided by a corrupt and secret bargain, they would have made it hot for all the traitors.

Whatever may be said of the minor characters who had a personal share on the spot in this dirty job, the mind of the people of New Brunswick will trace the contract to one source. When Mr. Foster on the hustings in this city was describing his opponent as the most unscrupulous politician in Canada, and when he spoke of the way in which Mr. Blair, had dragged down one public man after another, making traffic of their honor, and slaughtering their form, he did not know what was going on at that moment at Grand Falls. He had enough without that. It is only one more deal, one more successful attempt to degrade public life, to make politics disreputable, and to establish in this country a despotism based on corrupt personal bargain. Here are the people of a large constituency left absolutely powerless to say who shall speak for them at Ottawa. All is settled by a corrupt trade of which the people know nothing, though they are the merchandise.

She left this afternoon for St. John's via Sydney with a freight which included 2000 bags oats, 220 boxes butter, 185 boxes cheese, 120 b. l. vegetables, 8 b. l. oysters, 12 rolls leather, 114 sheep, 20 cattle and 12 tons straw.

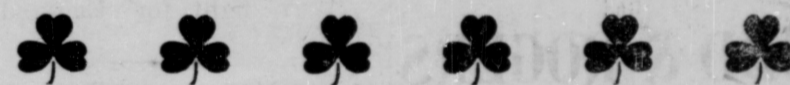
