**JET OVERTAKES GOOSE**

OTTAWA (CP)—A new aviation postage stamp, designed primarily for airmail letters to the United States, will be the first Canadian postal issue of 1967, the post office department announced today, showing a modern jet aircraft taking off from a Canadian airport, will replace the blue Canada goose design which has been in use since 1952.

## Liquor license Appeals Continued

At the second session of the appeal by the Southport Country Club against the decision of the P.E.I. Liquor Control Board to revoke their permit to purchase and sell liquor, three crown witnesses testified before Judge S. Clair Tractor, Friday.

Thomas Harris Fraser, 25, William Keating, 29, and James Everett Robertson, 17, all of Murray Harbor, testified that they had been together in the company of Alden Gordon, also from Murray Harbor, at the Southport club on the night of Dec. 7, last, and had all been served liquor with no questions asked, although none of the four belonged to the club or was the guest of a member.

Four reasons had been listed at the first session as to why the permit had been revoked. These were: No register was provided for the listing of members and guests; persons were admitted while not being accompanied by a member of the club; a minor was admitted and served liquor in the club and allowed to take liquor from the premises; and disorderly conduct was indulged in by intoxicated persons on club premises.

All three witnesses said they had signed a register and two of them agreed that Alden Gordon had wrestled with another person while in the club. The RCMP report stated that Robertson had come out of the club with an open bottle in his hand and during his testimony admitted that he did have an open bottle in his hand, which he had purchased in the club.

## United Fund Blitz Fails In Objective

**SUMMERSIDE** James Hogan, Summerside chairman for the United Fund Friday announced that the blitz staged Thursday in the Summerside area fell \$4,200 short of its objective.

The objective for the area is \$40,000 and prior to Thursday's canvassing the fund was \$7,000 short of its objective.

"We only collected \$600 in the residential areas," the chairman said, "and this leaves us short by \$2,500 in this division alone."

Local business firms came through with \$200, leaving an outstanding balance of \$1,000.

The division enjoying the most success was the payroll contributions. \$2,100 was pledged yesterday, leaving it \$300 short of its objective. Hogan says he hopes to reach this objective however.

Mr. Hogan said, "as we will have a couple of pick ups to make."

The advance gift division is also down by \$500, leaving the day long balance.

## Allied Youth Post Organized In School Rooms At Borden

David Boswell, director of alcohol studies and physical education in the province, addressed the chartering ceremony of Borden Allied Youth Post No. 892 at the Borden Legion Hall recently.

Head table guests included Winston Currie, superintendent of schools; Rev. Arthur Pendergast, Seven Mile Bay, and Rev. Ronald Cameron, Beedee.

Also present at the ceremony were Mrs. Charlotte Dalziel, trustee and secretary of the school trustees; Mrs. Robert Dalziel, Lead, wife of a third trustee.

All seven trustees of Borden School were in attendance.

In his address, Mr. Boswell urged the new members of Borden Allied Youth post to avail themselves of the scientific knowledge at hand in regards to alcoholic beverages, before they made their individual decision "to drink or not to drink."

He recommended an interest in active participation in sports and other wholesome activities to make "teen-age drinking" less desirable.

In remarking that many of the 2100 alcoholics in this province are drinking as teachers, he noted "There is no place whatsoever for alcoholic beverages at the high school level." He went on to say that "knowing that at least five or six people are hurt by each alcoholic, should be reason for each of you to consider carefully your role in the society of tomorrow."

Allied Youth membership in P.E.I. is now over 1300 and the rate of active participation is amazingly high. Mr. Boswell, in his address, also pointed out that Allied Youth provided a positive approach to the problem and through study and recreation and participation in its many functions one of its chief aims is being accomplished, the building of strong characters.

Mr. Currie congratulated the young people on the formation of the Allied Youth Post in Borden School and urged them to study the scientific facts concerning tobacco which were daily being brought to the attention of the public.

Rev. Ronald Cameron expressed his pleasure at being with the group for the Chartering Ceremony and told the young people they were doing the right thing in gaining knowledge early in life. He commended the students for their seeking after knowledge of alcohol and wished the members success in their endeavors.

Patricia Pendergast also impressed on the young people the importance of abstaining during school years and urged students to equip themselves with knowledge that would at least insure a greater measure of sobriety for future society. He also recommended further study of the tobacco situation.

The CMA, production and marketing research include the livestock, dairy, health of animals, poultry, plant protection, fruit and vegetable, and plant products divisions.

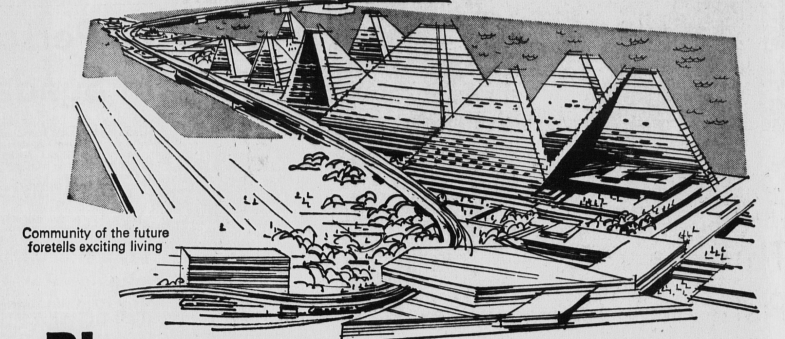

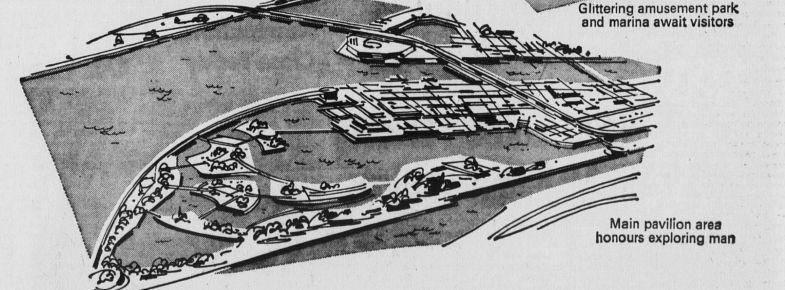
