She is deeply embedded in the sand, but at last reports there was no water in her hold, and her cargo of white oats was safe.

Several of our Island seiners have come home and gone into the potato carrying business. Nearly all the American mackerel killers have gone home where, it is hoped they may stay, until they are prepared to deal squarely on the fishery question.

WE regret to learn that the schooner Emerald, owned by Captain McKay, of Stanley, was stranded on the West Cape during the gale of last Thursday or Friday, and will likely be a total wreck. Captain McKay has been very sick all summer, and has not been able to leave his home to attend to any business, and the loss of the schooner is now a heavy one on him, owing to having had the expenses of new sails and gear about a year ago. THE Assistant Inspector of Post Offices, Mr. Brecken, last week visited the eastern part of the Island in his official capacity, and returned to town on Saturday. On Thursday he held an inquiry, in New Zealand School House, touching certain alleged irregularities in connection with the management of the Post Office at that place. Several witnesses were examined and the matter stands over for further consideration. Mr. Brecken has just completed his annual tour throughout the Island, and we have no doubt but that he found our Post Office machinery, as a whole, working smoothly and satisfactorily.

An indecent assault case was before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. The complainant, a young woman who lives in the neighborhood of Lower Spring Park Road, said that on Sunday evening last, while on her way to church, she was attacked by a number of persons on Pownal Street, who spoke and acted indecently towards her. The defendants—two young lads about sixteen years of age—were, she stated, the most hostile of the lot. The defendants flatly denied the girl's statements, and put several witnesses on the stand, who proved that they were not mixed up in the affair at all, being elsewhere at the time the assault is alleged to have taken place. The case was dismissed.

An old grey-haired man walked into the police station last evening and asked for lodging for the night. He informed the officer in charge that he had worked at his trade in this city for upwards of twenty years, but now age had unfitted him for work and he was without a home in which to spend his declining years. He said that he had been boarding for almost a year, but as his boarding master had a large family of his own to provide for he could not keep him any longer without some compensation. As a result, he was forced to seek a corner in the station until such time as he could secure assistance from the authorities. After warming himself at the stove, he was given the soft side of a bench for the night—the best accommodation the station afforded.

It will be learned with regret that Mr. J. L. Hatton, the eminent English composer, is dead, at the age of seventy-seven. Mr. Hatton was for some years director of the music at the Princess's Theatre, under Charles Keen, and while at that house he composed the music for "Macbeth" and "Sardanapalus" (1853), "Faust and Marguerite" (1854), "King Henry VIII." (1855), "Pizarro" (1856), "King Richard III." (1857), and "King Lear." "The Merchant of Venice," and "Much Ado About Nothing" (1858). He also composed two Cathedral services, several anthems, several books of part songs, and upwards of 150 songs. His opera called "Rose, or Love's Ransom," was produced in Covent Garden in 1854, and his "Robin Hood," a cantata, was first heard at the Bradford Musical Festival in 1856. One of his latest works was "Hazelkiss," a "sacred drama," which was produced at the Crystal Palace on December 15, 1877.—Toronto Week, Oct. 7, 1886.

The dam of Preceptor is Precept, by Pancoast, record 2.21; (sire of Patron, 3-year record 2.19), by Woodford's Mambino, record, 2.21; (sire of Abbotsford, 2.19); first dam of Pancoast by Harold, sire of Maud S., record 2.03 1/2. Breeders will see by the foregoing that Preceptor is fashionably bred, his sire being half-brother to Maud S., and the sire of his dam a nephew of Maud S. Messrs. Gardiner and Heartz are to be congratulated on getting so well a bred one.

France wants War.

The growth of the war feeling in France has been again exemplified. The Boulanger party have begun the issue of two new journals, *La Revanche* and *Le Soldat*. They advocate an offensive policy in vindication of the old military prestige of France. Gen. Boulanger, however, disowns any connection with the papers. M. Laredon, the military critic, writes the *Figaro* that Gen. Boulanger has prepared a well conceived plan in conjunction with a staff officer of high rank for a continental campaign. The *Militaire* says Gen. Boulanger desires war, not for the purpose of recovering Alsace, nor to gratify personal ambition, but as a step leading to the solution of social questions. The strictest taboo of everything German is being resumed. M. Tackray, Minister of Commerce, has ordered the police to prosecute all persons selling boxes of toys imported from Germany and containing a map of France without Alsace.
