Bishop Stresses Mother's Role At C.W.L. Convention

KITCHENER, Ont., (CP)—Strong Christian principles are needed to oppose modernisms that include a business career as the ideal of young women rather than a home and motherhood. Bishop Joseph F. Ryan of Hamilton told delegates to the 33rd annual convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

Bishop Ryan said Sunday that the role of the mother fell away from its high place a generation ago and a business career became the goal of young girls.

"Mothers of families were hard put to fight the causing evils of birth control, juvenile delinquency and threat of broken homes through divorce," he said.

It was up to mothers to bring back religious instruction to the home, he said, and impart goodness, knowledge and discipline and so "remain the leading lady in things that really count."
