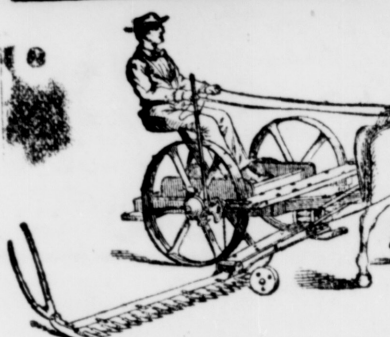

THE SUBSCRIBER has just imported into this Island, and is now receiving quite a large number of those celebrated Machines, embracing the **MANNY COMBINED REAPER and MOWER**, the **COMBINED MOWER and REAPER HAND RAKE MACHINE**, and the **BUCKEYE SELF-RAKING MACHINE**, for Reaping and Mowing. Also a lot of **WHITCOMB'S PATENT WHEEL HORSE RAKES**.

The **MANNY MACHINE** has this season some important improvements, such as an extra **Wooden Wheel and Axle** for Reaping, together with an extra **Bevel Gear** with a **Flange**, so as to prevent the Cogs from breaking. These two important improvements makes the **MANNY MACHINE** a perfect one of its kind.

The **BUCKEYE MACHINE** having been manufactured for the Subscriber under special contract, by **ADRIANCE, PLATT & Co.**, of Poughkeepsie, in the State of New York, who are the original manufacturers of the **BUCKEYE MACHINE**, and are the largest manufacturers of this Machine in the States, manufacturing from six to eight thousand Machines each year; and it is their Machine manufactured at their works, and entered by them for competition at all the great National and State Fairs in the United States, and for which they have taken the Gold Medals, and all the highest prizes in the States; they have also justly obtained the reputation of manufacturing the best Machine in the States both for Mowing and Reaping. All other establishments manufacturing the Buckeye are small compared to theirs—none of them making, I believe, over six or seven hundred machines each year;—and all improvements on the Buckeye come through **ADRIANCE, PLATT & Co.**

The **SELF-RAKER** is the best and latest improvement on the **BUCKEYE MACHINE**, and is not manufactured by any other establishment making the Buckeye. The **SELF-RAKING MACHINE** has proved a complete success the past year, and completely distancing all other Machines as **Self-Rakers**, made in the United States by others. This Machine saves the labor of one man, and the weight of a man on the team while Reaping. This **Self-Raking Machine** will also Reap and deliver in sheafs grain which has been broken down with rain or wind, unless very badly tangled, as the rake strikes the grain in front of the knives, and brings the grain on to the platform, when it is impossible for the hand rake to do it.

In consequence of my long connection with the Farmers of P. E. Island, in the sale of **MOWING MACHINES**, I feel it my duty to explain to them my views, and the motives that actuated me in first bringing the **MANNY MACHINE** to this Island some eight years past. It was then the best, and I might say about the only combined Machine in the States. The **Manny** gradually worked its way into general use on the Island, proving itself to be a good Machine to the Farmers, doing its work well, and all that was required of it to do, and to the full satisfaction of all who have used them here; and I could find no Machine in the States so well adapted for this Island as the **MANNY MACHINE**.

Last year I bought four of the Buckeye Machines, manufactured by **A. Richards & Co.**, of Worcester, but I was not satisfied with them, as they were not a perfect Machine, nor such as they ought to be, in my opinion, and I therefore could not feel that it would be right for me to say to the Farmers that the Machine was all right as a Reaper, when I did not believe it; but as a Mower I was willing, and did say to all, that they were good Mowers. When I returned home from the Island last fall, and knowing that **Adriance, Platt & Co.** were ahead of all the manufacturers of what they termed a **BUCKEYE MACHINE**, I went to their establishment, one hundred and fifty miles distant, hoping to find there a combined Machine that would satisfy my mind; and I did find the desired Machine, it having a separate cutting bar, guards and knives, all attached to the Platform, and fitted and ready to hitch on to the Machine as a Reaper, which made a perfect Machine, and fully satisfied my mind. This was the **HAND RAKING MACHINE**.

I then examined their **SELF-RAKING MACHINE**, and was better pleased with that than the **Hand-Raker**, as it is a splendid machine, doing all, and even more, than could be expected of a machine. The consequence was, I purchased of my Machines **Adriance, Platt & Co.** and in the course of the winter **A. Richards & Co.** went to **Adriance, Platt & Co.**, and purchased a Platform from them, with their improvement of a separate bar and knives for Reaping attachment, and attached them to their Machines—sent to this Island this spring. I did not purchase any No. 1 Buckeye this year, as I found they had gone out of use altogether, or nearly so. They made the No. 1 in the first place, but found them too heavy and clumsy. The No. 2 proved more acceptable to the Farmers for Mowing and Reaping.

My own individual opinion now is, and so is that of most of the farmers who have used the **MANNY MACHINE** that the **MANNY MACHINE**, with its improvements, is the **BEST MACHINE** for all Farmers of limited means, as it does its work well, and all that the farmers require it to do, and has no complication, and the mechanics of the Island know how to repair it. TO THE FARMERS

GENTLEMEN,—As we have noticed, in your local newspapers, certain statements, over the signature of "A. Booth," respecting the origin, manufacture, and sale of the Buckeye Mower and Reaper, calculated to mislead those who are unacquainted with the facts, we deem it our duty to place before the public a truthful and lucid history of the machine; and in order to be understood aright in the matter, we shall dispose of A. Booth's advertisement in the order in which it appears.

First, Mr. Booth asserts that **Adriance Platt & Co.**, were the original manufacturers. The **Buckeye** was first invented, manufactured, and patented by **Aultman & Miller**, of Canton, Ohio (from which State it has derived its trade-mark or name) they obtaining the first Gold Medal at the Great Field Trial held at Syracuse, New York State, in 1857, and they still continue to make nearly twice as many machines as any other establishment in the United States. The original inventors sold the right to manufacture, and sell their invention in certain territories; and among the different manufacturers the custom has been that in whichever territory a trial is held they enter and exhibit. That is to say: If a trial is held in the New England States we exhibit; if within **Adriance, Platt & Co's** territory they exhibit, and so on, Mr. Booth's assertion to the contrary notwithstanding, that **Adriance, Platt & Co's** manufacture is entered for competition "at all the Great National and State Fairs in the United States."

Mr. Booth further asserts that all improvements come through **Adriance, Platt & Co.** Scarcely a year has elapsed but we have found something new wherein we could improve the machine, and assist to bring it up to its present high standard. Last year, after much expense, we radically changed our mode of gears, by which we dispensed with the internal gearing, (which we always considered a hard running gear,) by substituting an external gear, by which more perfect gearing is secured—which runs lighter, stiller, and is more durable, and more easily repaired should any repairs be required. This, and other improvements of smaller importance were originated by us; and we make bold to say, and have ample testimony, that the machine exhibited for sale by **A. Booth** is the style which we made two years ago, save and except some minor alterations, which, in our opinion, are of a damaging nature to the machine.

Respecting the "Self Raker," when our minds are satisfied of its practicability, and it becomes simplified, and brought out of its present complicated condition, we will apply it to our machine, as we are of opinion that in its present stage it requires too much motive power, and is too expensive to be of general use; yet we believe that, in the course of time, it will be accomplished. Furthermore, Mr. Booth asserts that he brought on your Island, last season, four "Buckeyes," made by **A. Richards & Co.**, of Worcester. No such manufacturing establishment exists in Worcester, or elsewhere, to our knowledge, in the United States. Mr. Booth had four machines of our manufacture, which he obtained after some solicitude, which we are led to believe he purchased for sinister purposes. Mr. B. was too well aware of the repute of the "Buckeyes" in the U. S. to compete against it here with his favorite "Manny," should it get into the hands of the farmers. Although Mr. Booth's estimate of your intellectual capacity was by no means high, we are glad to find that he has altered his mind, and discovered that you have sufficient "brains" to run a Buckeye this year. Besides the Machines which Mr. B. had last year, we consigned ten machines to Mr. John Higgins, of your city, which were all sold, despite Mr. B.'s stiff bow at their introduction, and we leave it to those farmers who ran the Machine last year, to say "whether they were perfect, and such as they should be, or not." We have in our possession testimonials from many of the most respectable farmers, who ran the machine last season, respecting its merits, and we have yet to learn of any dissatisfaction,—not one purchaser has yet enquired for an extra piece to supply any defect or breakage, although our agents have extras constantly on hand.
