## Increased Cost Of Sugar Is Given Growing Attention

By GREG MACDONALD Canadian Press Staff Writer The rising cost of sugar has been given growing attention on the Canadian business scene for some time. Currently at \$18.65 for a 100-pound bag, the price has changed 89 times since Jan. 1 when it was \$9.10. There have been 65 increases and 24 decreases. And, says Canada and Dominion Sugar Co. Ltd., the situation may get worse. N. W. Davis, vice-president of the company, said in Montreal last week that current reports indicate a serious shortage of sugar on the world market. He said adverse weather has again helped to reduce world sugar crops and below normal yields are predicted in several of the major producing areas. "As a result, it now appears that the 1963-1964 world production will be less than 2,000 million tons, far below the anticipated increase in consumption," he said. Mr. Davis said Canada need not fear a sugar shortage because it is willing to pay the world price. Our sugar is guaranteed to us under the Commonwealth Sugar Agreement. As long as we are willing to pay the price, these countries will reserve enough sugar for us to cover our needs for 1963-64. The government also is showing some concern about sugar's rising cost. Justice Minister Chevrier and Finance Minister Gordon said in the Commons last week that an increase in sugar prices will be forthcoming following study of the problem with Trade Minister Sharp. Mr. Gordon said the statement will show the difference which countries over the years have purchased sugar and will cite the advantages and disadvantages of the various systems. Mr. Gordon was replying to a question by T. C. Douglas, New Democratic Party Leader, about why there should be such a difference in the cost of a five-cent bag of sugar in Canada and the United States. Mr. Douglas said the price for a five-cent bag in the U.S. was 49 cents compared with 96 cents in Canada. Elsewhere on the business scene, Canadian dividend payments at the end of the year indicate to some extent that it has been a good year for Canadian investors. However, Payments in the first 11 months of the year totalled \$181,144,000 compared with \$176,860,744 in the corresponding period last year. November payments alone totalled \$37,221,281 compared with \$39,585,268 in November last year. However, a special dividend of \$52 a share by Domnaco added \$175,755,644 to the total. ## CHANCE FIND RECALLS ARMISTICE NEWS RELAY

OTTAWA (CP) - A chance find at the University of California of an unusual telegram graph record has recalled the method used to let the people of Ottawa know when the First World War ended. In those days people awaiting news for word of an armistice with Germany had no broadcasting stations to flash the news. The electric power line that carried the telegram was shut off for 15 seconds on Monday, Nov. 11, 1918, at 10 minutes and 48 seconds after 3 a.m. This novel method of communicating the signing of the armistice was recorded on a micrograph at the Dominion Observatory by Dr. Otto Klotz, former Dominion astronomer. At the time the record seemed unimportant and very little was said of it except in scientific circles. Dr. Klotz sent copies of the record to the exact time the power was turned off in Ottawa because his micrograph was operated by electricity. However, the graph paper in the instrument was turned mechanically, and when the power was cut a blank spot appeared on the graph. Dr. Klotz sent copies of the record to various scientific institutions, including the University of California. A copy was filed at Ottawa but officials say no one has seen it for many years and finding it would be a major discovery. A copy of the record was found last month at the University of California by Perry Byerly, retiring professor of astronomy. He came across the copy as he was going through old files and sent it to Dr. John H. Rodgers, chief of the astronomical division of the Dominion Observatory.

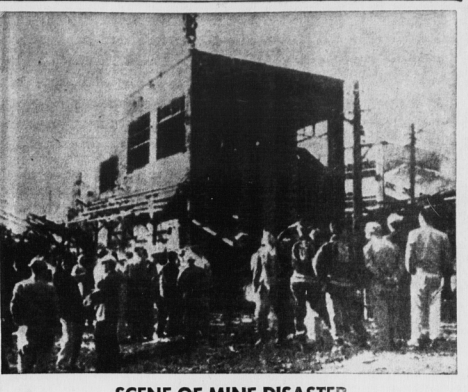
