

Mrs. Eisenhower Wins Acclaim At Ottawa

OTTAWA, (CP)—Mamie came to town Friday and won the hearts and acclaim of this usually staid capital.

The wife of President Eisenhower, with her bangs and warm smile, set up a murmur of praise and admiration among the Canadian diplomatic set.

The feeling spread among the thousands of spectators around the station and war memorial. They had been standing for hours in chilly, overcast streets to greet the president and his wife.

"Hi, Ike! Hi, Mamie!" they shouted, waving and applauding as the couple walked 100 yards from the station to the war memorial in Confederation Square.

Mrs. Jeanne St. Laurent, wife of the prime minister, presented Mrs. Eisenhower with a bouquet of tiny, sweetheart roses and blue orchids. They shook hands warmly.

"Mrs. Eisenhower said Sweetheart roses are her favorite flowers," Mrs. St. Laurent told reporters later.

Asked if she would pay Mamie a return visit, Mrs. St. Laurent replied: "Well, I haven't been invited yet."

Mrs. Eisenhower appeared on the Canadian scene wearing a green velvet hat, a fur cape and a dark grey, pleated dress.

She stood by her husband's side in the train shed, shaking hands with the Canadian cabinet ministers and their wives, parliamentary officials and diplomats.

Supreme Court Justice Follows Truman's Lead

WASHINGTON, (CP)—Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark followed Harry Truman's example Friday and declined to heed a subpoena calling on him to testify before a congressional committee in the Harry Dexter White case.

The case is expected to remain in eclipse from now till next Tuesday when Attorney-General Herbert Brownell is scheduled to appear before the Senate internal security sub-committee.

Justice department officials said Brownell plans to give the sub-committee a "comprehensive statement" about the case.

Brownell lit the fuse for Washington's biggest political explosion in many a day with charges a week ago that former president Truman promoted White from assistant treasury secretary to U.S. director of the International Monetary Fund in 1946 although FBI reports to the White House had shown White to be a Communist spy.

Brownell said copies of the FBI reports also went to Clark, who was Truman's attorney general at the time, to the state department where James P. Byrnes was secretary and to half a dozen other key officials.

In the House of Representatives un-American activities committee, which vainly issued fast subpoenas for Truman, Byrnes and Clark, plans for hearings are in a state of indefinite suspension. The committee was taking a back seat for the time being and the Republican national committee had a hand in putting it there.

It was learned that the national committee was upset by the House committee's issuance of a subpoena to Truman—an action which some officials at Republican headquarters considered a political blunder.

London's Smog Killed 12,000

LONDON, (Reuters) - London's great smog last December killed 12,000 persons—4,000 that month and 8,000 who died from after-effects in the next two months—a British scientist said Wednesday.

And every mid-winter day sees more than 2,000 tons of sulphur dioxide and 2,000 tons of deadly carbon monoxide shot into the air of greater London, he added.

Dr. E. T. Wilkins, officer in charge of the atmospheric pollution section of the department of scientific and industrial research, told a meeting of the Royal Sanitary Institute it comes from the waste gases of coal, coke and fuel oils providing heat and power for the metropolis, and from the exhausts of automobiles.

Wilkins said his department is trying to find out why London experienced fog in such lethal concentration last December.

All Property of Egyptian Royal Family Confiscated

CAIRO, (Reuters) - The Egyptian revolutionary command council Sunday night ordered the confiscation of all the property in Egypt of the former royal family.

The council recently confiscated all the property of ex-King Farouk, now living in exile in Italy with his infant son, ex-king Fuad.

This ruling applies to the 100-odd members of the Mohammed Aly dynasty and all persons related to them by marriage or inheritance. All their property in Egypt will revert to the state.

Among those affected are: Crown Prince Mohammed Aly, Farouk's aged cousin, who lives in Europe; Farouk's mother, ex-queen Nazli, living in the United States; his sisters; and scores of former princes, princesses and their relatives.

Their property runs into several million dollars. It consists of land, palaces, stocks and shares, jewelry, objects of art, paintings and other valuables.

India Proposes Private Talks On Disarmament

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., (CP)—India proposed Monday that Canada, Britain, the United States, France and Russia conduct private talks on disarmament.

The proposal was made during the UN disarmament debate by V. K. Krishna Menon who offered the 60-nation UN political committee a watered-down version of the peace plan he outlined in a speech last September.

He suggested that the assembly go on record as expressing its desire for elimination of atomic, bacterial and chemical weapons and all such means of mass destruction.

Forty-four countries, including Canada, have introduced a resolution calling on the UN disarmament commission to continue efforts to reach agreement.

Menon's proposals were in the form of amendments to this resolution.
