Low Wages for Women.

Miss Jennie Collins, says the Boston Advertiser, has prepared the thirteenth annual report of her good work at Beffin's Bower, and the document will be found interesting by all friends of the poor working girls, among whom Miss Collins has laboured faithfully so long. She discusses the question of low wages at length, of the practical result of which she says:—"It has been the cause of the early death of some of the purest and most beautiful young women. In the course of the last year, five in whom I was particularly interested died of consumption, and one committed suicide by drowning—all under 22 years of age. They could earn from three to four dollars per week. It would be impossible for them to get 21 of the plainest meals for less than three dollars; consequently they had to resort to one meal or a meal and a half a day." The report speaks of an improved condition of saleswomen, but, nevertheless, Miss Collins says much abuse is still practised:—"One class of storekeepers pay \$3 per week; the work begins at half-past seven in the morning; they allow one half-hour for dinner, half-hour for supper; than the girls are required to return in the evening and remain till nine o'clock except Saturday, when the day is prolonged till eleven. And what is most difficult to comprehend is the fact that working people are the principal patrons to such an establishment." The report gives few statistics concerning the writer's work, nor does she devote much space to a recital of details. It is said, however, that 1,604 applications for assistance were made to her, and the history of some interesting individual cases is given.

White Specks in Butter.

Butter makers are frequently troubled by the appearance of white specks in the butter, which are caused by too rapid souring of the milk or by keeping the cream in too warm a place. Sometimes in the gathered cream system they are caused by the cream churning while en route to the creamery. When the cream is churned on the farm it should be stirred every day as fresh cream is added to it. It has been hauled to the creamery it should be thoroughly strained before being put into the cream vat. When fresh cream containing more or less milk is mixed with that which has been skimmed previous and has become somewhat sour the milk is at once curdled and the small flakes of curd become inclosed in masses of cream which are quite impossible to separate from the butter after churning. Careful management of the cream is the best preventive, and the careful ones will note that there may be other causes, such as over-ripe cream, containing more or less lopped milk. Whatever the cause, careful straining of the cream will help to remedy the evil.—Michigan Farmer.

A few English journals of the baser sort, and a large number of the American journals of the same description have been engaged criticising adversely and sneeringly at the respect shown by the Queen for the memory of her faithful servant, John Brown. "Why," says these alleged democratic newspapers "the Queen is actually parading her administration for a mere gillie." True; and in our opinion Her Majesty in taking the measures she is taking to

And for doing so she should be applauded rather than condemned by her alleged democratic critics. Evidently the difference between the Queen and her critics is that she is at heart a democrat, while there are in reality nothing but snobs who cannot bear to see honors conferred on "a mere gillie," no matter how faithful and deserving his conduct may have been.
