Anslow Death Inquest Adjudged To Aug. 27

Inquest into the death of Mrs. (Idya) Richard Anslow of Summerside last night was adjourned by coroner Dr. Alan MacMillan for two weeks pending the appearance in court of Andrew Pronovost, also of Summerside. According to the coroner a summons will be issued for the missing witness, who reportedly is on sick leave from the RCMP and away from the island.

Mrs. Anslow was killed in an accident July 15 when the car in which she was a passenger went off the road and smashed into a guardrail on the South Neville Road just off the Trans Canada Highway between Charlottetown and Borden. Five witnesses were heard during last night's session. Dr. David Stewart of Crapaud was the first witness. He went to the scene of the accident and found Mrs. Anslow in the car.

INQUEST RESUMES
Two of the people injured in the crash, Judy Blanche Hancock and Jean Ivan Carigan, driver of the car, both of Summerside, gave evidence at the inquest.

Ivan Newrick of Borden, who drove his service station tow truck to the scene, also appeared, and there was one RCMP witness, Constable Donald E. Shears.

Pronovost, the absent witness, was a passenger in the car.

Named to the coroner's jury for the investigation are Ralph Kennel MacLeod, foreman; Ailister Scott MacPherson, Vernon Webster; Penny B. J. Theodore MacArthur; Paul Eugene Flood; Irving James MacLeod, all of Charlottetown, and George Gordon Gillespie of Cornwall.

The inquest resumes Thursday, August 27 at 7:30 a.m. with the appearance of Pronovost.

FARM PROGRESS
August 13th normally marks the date when hay-making should be completed or when it is possible to make a good quality fodder. However, 1964 seems to be an exception and some combination of factors has kept the hay crop from curing on the stump. There are still many fields of clover showing much bloom and from which it is still possible to make fair feed. In spite of a rather druggy hay making the ground is now quite dry and in need of moisture for the continued development of pasture and food crops. The grain crop which is well on the way to maturity is a very promising one and can hardly fail to be quite satisfactory.

One of the newer crops that amazes us with its rapid growth is brassica sprouts. This plant seems to be in a special class by itself when it comes to rapid development.

EDUCATION
The announcement made by the Minister of Education that a Committee is to be set up to study and advise on matters related to agricultural education is a welcome announcement. The Federation has been, since the first of the year, endeavouring to focus attention on and develop interest in this problem. Its interest is dictated by a realization that those who will operate our farms in the future will require not only a broader education but a more technical one than has been the case in the past. The fact that farms are getting larger and require more capital investment and greater requirements for management ability and operating skill, has realized that P.E.I. parents haven't, up to this point, shown very great interest in the need of improved education for farmers. Perhaps there may have been a time when energy and strength by themselves would overcome farm problems, but it doesn't appear that much more is required at the present time and in the future.
