Airmen Return To West Berlin

BERLIN (Reuters)—The three-man crew of a French airliner returned to West Berlin today after spending nearly 24 hours in Soviet custody.

They had crossed into East Berlin for lunch Wednesday before a scheduled afternoon flight back to Paris in their Air France DC-4. A substitute crew flew the plane back and Soviet authorities were asked about the men's whereabouts.

A French high commission spokesman disclosed the trio had been handed over by Soviet authorities.

The three said they took the wrong train after spending the afternoon in East Berlin, and travelled east instead of west.
