

Phillies Defeat Dodgers White Sox & Yanks Split

The surprising Philadelphia Phillies advanced a half step closer to first place in the National League Sunday with their third straight victory over Brooklyn and Chicago White Sox maintained their five-game lead in the American League.

Defeated 3-1 by Detroit in their opener of their doubleheader, the White Sox came back to win the second game 4-1 behind the fourth pitching of Jack Harshman. The split enabled Chicago to pick up a half game on Cleveland Indians, who were beaten 8-2 by Kansas City and dropped into third place 3 1/2 games off the pace.

The Yankees failed to pick up ground when they were held to a split by Baltimore. They had to battle back for a split, winning the second game 4-0 behind the third pitching of rookie Ralph Terry after Bill Wight gave the Orioles their third in a row over the world champions with a three-hit 3-2 triumph.

Ted Williams' three-run homer, his 12th of the season, gave Boston Red Sox a 5-3 victory over Washington and a one-game lead over the fifth place Tigers.

TWO-RUN HOMER

Stan Lopata's two-run homer, Dick Farrell's strong relief pitching and a stout defense earned the second-place Phillies a 5-3 victory over the Dodgers. The victory moved the Phils to within two games of the front-running Cincinnati Reds, who were held to a split by the Chicago Cubs. After Bob Thurman's grand slam homer had given the Reds the first game 6-4, Chicago came back to win the second game 4-2 behind the three-hit pitching of

Bob Rush and Don Elston. Bobby Thomson's two-run single in the third and Ernie Johnson's brilliant relief job in the ninth highlighted Milwaukee's 3-1 triumph over St. Louis, which pushed the Braves into third place, one game in front of Brooklyn. Pittsburgh swept both ends of a doubleheader from New York Giants 3-2 and 2-0 and added insult to injury by halting Willie Mays after he had hit in his 21 successive games in the opener.

PITCHING DUEL

Brooklyn's Don Newcombe and Philadelphia's Bob Miller were locked in a 1-1 duel when the Phillies broke the game wide open with a three-run outburst in the fourth. Rip Repulski singled, stole second and with two out, scored on Harry Anderson's double. Lopata then sent a drive into the upper left field stands so close to the foul line that umpire Augie Donahill paused momentarily before calling it fair.

Farrell relieved Miller with two on and none out in the fifth. He took over a two-ball, no-strike count on Junior Gilliam and struck out the Dodger second baseman. On an attempted double steal, Newcombe was out at third and before Duke Snider fled out to end the inning.

The Phillies helped Farrell gain his third victory against one loss by executing five double plays. It was Newcombe's fifth defeat against four victories.

DISSIPATED LEAD

The Cubs dissipated a 4-0 lead in the first game when the Redlegs capitalized on Moe Drabow's wildness to pound out five runs in the fourth. The Cubs' bonus pitcher hit two batters and issued three walks before and af-

ter Thurman's grand slammer. Herh Freeman, fourth Redleg hurler, allowed two hits in five innings to collect his third victory without a loss. Dale Long's double featured a two-run Chicago rally in the third inning of the second game that broke a 1-1 tie. Rush won his first game in seven decisions but had to give way to Elston in the sixth after he pulled a leg spasm, springing from first to third. He is expected to be out a week to 10 days.

Johnson rescued starter Bob Buhl after the first two Cardinals had walked in the ninth. He threw a double play ball to pinch hitter Walker Cooper and struck out Don Blasingame to end the game and again Milwaukee's three-game losing streak. It was Buhl's fourth victory against one defeat.

Dee Fondy collected five hits and drove in runs in each game as Pittsburgh's double triumph over the Giants. Ronnie Kline won his first game after seven defeats in the opener but needed ninth in-

ning help from Luis Arroyo. Bob Purkey scattered four hits in the nightcap for his fourth victory against three defeats. Harshman, in posting his first White Sox victory since May 1, permitted the Tigers only two hits in the last eight innings. Walt Dropp's sixth homer helped Harshman gain his fourth victory. All Kaline collected four of Detroit's 12 hits in the opener and scored all three runs as Jim Bunning out-pitched rookie Bill Fischer.

Held to three hits by Wight in the opener, the Yankees erupted for four runs against Skinny Brown in the first inning of the nightcap to gain a split. Three home runs — by Mickey Mantle, Yogi Berra and Elston Howard — accounted for all the runs.

A sixth-inning rally against relief ace Ray Narleski enabled Kansas City to break a 2-2 tie with Cleveland and win the rubber of its three-game set with the Indians. Bob Cerv's bases-loaded triple climaxed the winning rally.

NEW YORK (CP) — Even the new Cincinnati scoreboard couldn't keep up with the total Saturday as the Redlegs set a season-high run against Chicago. The final score was 22-2 with the Redlegs blasting seven homers. Frank Robinson hit two home runs and Hal Jeffcoat, Gus Bell, Ed Bailey, Don Hoak and Wally Post one each in the National League lead-off short of tying the record they already share with the Braves. The American League mark is also eight, by New York Yankees in 1939.

The Redlegs also had five doubles in their 22-hit total as they scored nine runs in the fifth and seven more in the sixth. Chicago White Sox clubbed Detroit 12-4 in the American League with a 17-hit attack that included 16 singles.

Connie Johnson doled out eight hits for his 4-3 victory over New York Yankees with the help of Billy Gardner's two-run homer in the fourth off Johnny Kucks, the loser.

HAMMER NAT'S Boston hammered Washington for a 11-1 win that featured a three-run homer in the third inning by Norm Zauchin.

In the National, New York Giants edged Pittsburgh 3-2. Daryl Spencer's double in the ninth beat Bob Friend after the Giants rallied to tie the score with two runs in the eighth.

Rookie Jack Sanford checked Brooklyn Dodgers on two hits for a 3-0 Philadelphia victory in a night game. Sanford also contributed a run-scoring double. Rip Repulski's first inning two-run homer accounted for the other tally.

Milwaukee braves dropped a 7-1 decision to St. Louis Cardinals as Murry Dickson held the Braves to six hits. Dickson, also driving in two runs in the Cards' five-run eighth inning.

In a third night game, Cleveland beat Kansas City 3-0.

Reid Jack Wins Bt. Golf Title

FORMBY, England (CP)—Reid Jack, a grim-faced former commando, won the British amateur golf title Saturday for Scotland, defeating Harold Ridgley of the United States 2 and 1.

The 33-year-old Glasgow man's 36-hole final with Ridgley, 43-year-old master sergeant in the U.S. Air Force, was hailed as the best-played amateur title competition seen for years.

Age may have played a part in the victory of the wartime commando parachute lieutenant from Scotland, the home of golf, over the rugged little sergeant from Haverford, Pa., who has been stationed in Britain for 10 years. The morning cards were 24-35 for Jack and 24-35-72 for Ridgley over the 6,803-yard par 72 course beside the Irish Sea.

Both competitors won the hearts of the gallery with their gentle, manly conduct, which was spiced with a taciturn refusal to chat. **NAME UNKNOWN** Ridgley, who is stationed at Watford, England, was such a stranger in major golf competition that his name was spelled, Ridgley on the scoreboard at the very end. Jack is a former Scottish champion.

In the afternoon Jack was out in 36 and played eight holes back in 36. Ridgley, tiring fast, was out in 36 and also played eight holes back in 35. At lunch, Jack was 2 up.

When the final was over and the last of the 11 rounds played during the week was finished, Ridgley said: "Man, I'm dead beat. That's a lot of golf and I'm not going to hit another shot for two weeks." When Jack received the towering silver trophy once held by such as Bobby Jones, Lawson Little and Harvey Ward, he said: "This is the greatest moment of my golfing career."

An RAF base adjoining Formby Links sent dozens of big transport planes look over the players during the final but it was nothing to bother Jack or Ridgley.

Jack was parachuted behind enemy lines in Burma and China during the Second World War and fought Japanese soldiers bayonet to bayonet. Ridgley was a tail gunner in a Flying Fortress, wounded once by flak and later shot down over Germany and held a prisoner for three years.

Gets Confidence To Run Mile In Less Than 4 Minutes

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP)—A losing race gave Californian Don Bowden the confidence he needed to become the first American to run the mile in less than four minutes.

Three weeks ago in the West Coast relays at Fresno, the six-foot-three junior from the University of California travelled the anchor leg of a distance medley relay in 4:02.6 although nipped in the stretch.

"After that Fresno race, I felt I would be able to do better. It gave me lots of confidence," said Bowden, who set his own pace Saturday night to speed the mile in 3:58.7 during the Pacific Association AAU track and field meet here.

Bowden, 20, had run only four open miles prior to the performance that shattered Wes Santee's American-citizen's record of 4:00.5. It was only .7 off John Landy's world record.

Although Don's best official time for an open mile previously was 4:08.2 last year, his performance didn't appear a great surprise to him or his coach, Brutus Hamilton.

"We figured this was my last chance this season to run a fast mile and I was in physical condition to go," Don said.

"I planned to run a four-minute pace as long as I could," the 160-pound pre-law student said. "After three laps, I felt great and I just hoped I could push it. I was able to."


His front-running quarter-mile lap times were announced as 59.7; 61.1; 59.8 and 58.1.

Jack Wilcox of Fresno State was second, timed at 4:13.4. Only Landy of Australia, the world record holder at 3:58, and his fellow countryman, Jim Bailey, with 3:58.6, have posted better times.

Last season a pulled heel tendon hampered Bowden, but he made the U.S. Olympic team with a third-place finish in the 1,500-metre trials.

Then he became ill with mononucleosis and, although he recovered in time to compete at Melbourne, he didn't make the finals.
