NOTES FROM SUMMERSIDE.

The Day Well Kept.

On the Rail—But not on the Beer.

TALK WITH A CATTLE BUYER.

Prince County and its Stock Output.

The holiday was well and very generally observed. Quite a number took advantage of the half-fare trip to Moncton. In fact the steamer was crowded both going out and coming in.

The railway, too, was well patronized; and we could not help noticing how easily the "Summerside" and the "Charlottetown" glided along and rounded the "graceful curves." The Railway is now a great credit to the Government. The track is one of the best in Canada. The rolling stock is first-class; the officers and men are, as a rule, skilful, careful and courteous.

It was a good thought of the Superintendent to make the holiday tickets at half fare, good for three days. The result was good all round. The railway got passengers which it otherwise would not have carried, and, as to wear and tear, it was not one whit the worse; while the public received a substantial advantage for which they give Mr. Coleman credit.

By the way all those who remember Summerside, as it was on the eve of a holiday years ago, must have been struck by the sobriety and good order which prevailed on the streets on the eve of this Dominion Day. There were many people; but there was no drunkenness, no loud swearing—scarcely any one to be seen on the streets under the influence of liquor.

In Charlottetown, the day was generally observed. Private picnics and excursions were general, and we are pleased to note passed off without accident. The Benevolent Irish Society's Picnic was quite successful at Bedford; and the Tea Party at Suffolk was a pleasant and enjoyable affair and a financial success.

Mr. Avard—the veteran cattle buyer—brought into Summerside to-day, twenty-seven head of very fine cattle, obtained during a short tour in the Beauce district. A cow, four years old, which he bought from Mr. Archibald McCallum, of Lower Beauce, a short time ago, gave him 860 lbs. of dressed beef. Another cow that he bought from Mr. Archibald M. Wright, of Centerville, weighed 1,740 lbs. This was the best cow he ever purchased. Four very fine cattle fed by Mr. John McFarlane, of Sea Cow Head, and purchased by him, weighed on an average 1,300 lbs. A very fine lot, numbering nine or ten, and averaging 1,200 lbs., were purchased by him from the Messrs. Haslam, of Springfield. One of these, a bull weighed 2,200 lbs.

Mr. Avard says that since he first came to the island to buy fat cattle, ten years ago, there has been a decided improvement on the part of our farmers in breeding and feeding. His observations have been confined for the most part to Prince County. Those who have the best heads he has seen in the Province are Messrs. Archibald McCallum, of Lower Beauce, and Alexander Anderson, of Sea Cow Head. Mr. McCallum has a bull, which at two years old, tipped the scales at 1,500 lbs.

He thinks that if farmers would pay still more attention to stockraising, it would be better for themselves and better for the country. Of course there is a drawback in the difficulty, and, during a large part of the year, the impossibility of conveying stock off the island. But when the Ferry is established between Capes Traverse and Tormentine, this drawback will be, in great part, overcome; for there will be only about two months in each year during which a steamer cannot cross. The island is about as well suited for stock-raising as the marsh lands of New Brunswick being counterbalanced by the superiority of our soil for raising roots. Yet, while the best of our farmers fatten but two or three, or four cattle in a year, there are men in New Brunswick who fatten as many as two hundred in a year. Smith Brothers, in Albert county, fattened as many as 225 last year; and Mr. Josiah Wood, M. P. for Westmoreland, usually sells three lots a year, each lot numbering seventy or eighty head.

An idea of the value of this business may be gathered from the fact that Mr. Avard, last year paid out in Prince County, for fat cattle and sheep, upwards of \$25,000. The average price he pays for cattle is \$50 a head—for an extra good one he pays as high as \$90.

The steamer Titian made her second visit to Summerside this morning and took on board a thousand bushels of oats for Halifax. The Titian is a very fine ship.
