**FARMING IN COMPANY.**

A company has been formed in Russell County, Ontario, for the purpose of raising stock and carrying out, in all its branches, the business of farming. It seems to us that this is an example which might well be followed by some farmers in Prince Edward Island. Suppose a farmer with a large farm and several sons, would it not be better, in at least some cases, for them to unite in a joint stock company, work together, and draw the profits according to the proportion of shares held by each member, than to divide, leave the old people alone, and go to the States? Large manufacturing and other establishments are successfully managed by co-operation; why not farming? The idea seems to be worthy of consideration.

**BRITISH COLUMBIA'S PERIL.**

Under this heading the Daily Globe of Victoria says:

"Never before in the history of the Province were public affairs in so disturbed a state. The people are bewildered. They see on all sides evidences of the stupid blundering of an incompetent Government. They see business on all sides unsettled. Mines are closing down, throwing hundreds out of employment; capital is alarmed; disputes innumerable are arising; where yesterday there was progress to-day there is stagnation. And this at a time when the country should be going ahead by leaps and bounds.

"It is not a time for a wrangle between political parties, not a time for personal bickering. The situation is far too grave for that. A cruel fate has placed the administration of the public affairs of this Province in the hands of a set of men absolutely and hopelessly incompetent. It is but the bald truth to say that no country on earth ever suffered from misgovernment to such an extent in so short a time as has British Columbia since assumption of office by the band of wreckers now in charge. Wreckers is a fit title to apply to the present Government. Every single act they have perpetrated has been calculated to stay the progress of the country."

—Senator Ferguson has been getting a new batch of names of those up West who received fishing bounties and never wet a line. For right down rascality the party of purity easily takes the cake.

—Commenting upon the prospect of an election next fall, the Montreal Star remarks that, "it is not usual for Canadian Parliament to die at the early age of three years, but we never had a Parliament we could better spare."

—The telegraphic reports omitted mention of the fact that Mr. Louis Fraser, of North River St. Eleanor, brother of Miss Fraser, of this city, a first year student of King's College, won the Welsford Testimonial this year. Mr. Fraser has our congratulations.

—The whole country commends the action of Sir McKenzie Bowell and Senator Ferguson in holding up the Drummond and other legislation until necessary returns are brought down. The little populus of the Government have not frightened the Senate worth a cent.

—The Montreal Star suggests the following as a suitable epitaph for the present Dominion Parliament:

Here lies Dominion Parliament Number Eight,  
It didn't go far and it never went straight;  
The only thing it did in the patriotic line  
Was to die and make way for Parliament Number Nine.

That may be better and it can't be worse than this humbugging spendrift, ill-mannered little cuss.

Montreal Star: The Queen's Printer is as busy just now as the devil in a gale of wind, getting out the voters list, and Liberal members Parliament are privately notifying their friends to prepare for general elections in the autumn. These indications do not necessarily mean that the general elections are to be held this year, but they unquestionably mean that the Government desires to be ready to hold the elections in case of certain eventualities, at short notice, soon after the close of the present session. The ministers, notwithstanding the bye-elections, are conscious of losing ground in the country, and may decide that it is the better policy to cut their losses short. Their whole course this session has been panicky, ridiculously so in view of their big majority and their successes at the polls since the general elections.

**SUPREME COURT.**

WEDNESDAY, June 28.

The case of Davies vs. Moore, which began yesterday afternoon, is before the Court again today.

The Grand Jury yesterday found true bills against James McIntyre, indicted for assaulting his wife, and against Joseph Cameron, Henry Walsh and David Bell, indicted for housebreaking and larceny.

In the cases of John P. Joy and Edward Hennessey the witnesses did not appear and the indictments were for the present withdrawn from the jury.

Yesterday, in the course of his address to the Grand Jury, the Chief Justice made an affecting reference to the late Judge Alley, by whose death the administration of justice in this county has sustained a great loss.

Today the Grand Jury are visiting the asylum and other Government institutions.

—Sir Hibbert Tupper seems to be getting in his work at Ottawa. It will be interesting to note the action of the government party respecting the charges brought against the Minister of the Interior.

—According to Sir Wilfrid Laurier the cost of the Prohibition plebiscite did not come quite up to \$200,000. But nearly \$200,000 were thrown away.
