DEAR SIR,—I noticed in the last issue of your weekly journal a correspondence from the Captain of the Fort Augustus Base Ball Club, closely resembling the pedantic style of a pedagogue, and in which the Captain attempts to white wash a glaring act of meanness with falsehood and ridicule. He is sadly mistaken if he thinks he can use these feeble weapons against us with impunity. When he admits that the "K. C. Advertiser" is a Phoenix in his part, he only admits a partial cause of his own manifest ignorance; and, if he ever wishes to emerge from his present illiterate state, I would advise him to read the literary journals of the day. The Governor General visits Chatham and Newcastle.

(Special to the St. John Sun.)

CHATHAM, N. B., Aug. 14.—The Governor General arrived last night at 11 o'clock. To-day is a general holiday, and Chatham never looked better. Water street is the centre of attraction, evergreen and bunting filling every available space. At three p.m. a salute from Captain Gillespie's battery announced the landing of His Excellency at the old Peabody pier. Guards of honor from Gillespie's battery and companies Nos. 4 and 5 met him there. After the usual preliminaries His Excellency declining to use a carriage, walked to the public hall to receive the citizen's address which was read and presented by R. Carman Esq. After leaving the hall, he was driven to Senator Muirhead's after remaining there for a short time he was driven to Snowballs mill where he was delighted by the many improvements in deal manufacture and at the extensive works going on in that business. From the mill he was driven to Mr. Snowball's residence and partook of his hospitality. His Excellency then returned to the "Druid" and steamed for Newcastle.

Movements of the Fishing Fleet.

The prominent feature in the fishing movements the past week has been the unusual large receipts of halibut, 9 arrivals having been reported from the Banks, with 3,560 lbs., to which the Georges fleet have added 13,200 lbs. more. Several of the fleet report good fares, schr. Ivanhoe hauling for 75,000 lbs., the Plymouth Rock for 70,000 lbs., and the Gatherer for 60,000 lbs. The best fare landed this season was 94,000 lbs. by schr. Chester B. Lawrence in May. The largest receipts for any previous week this year were 313,000 lbs. Bank and 36,000 lbs Georges, for the week ending July 15.

Bank codfish have also been in good receipts. Schr. Hattie E. Newman, of Beverly, arrived on Friday with 100,000 lbs., and three good fares were received during Sunday and Monday, schr. Noonday hauling for 160,000 lbs., the Addison G. Porter for 120,000 lbs., and the Mystic for 100,000 lbs. Schr. Mary E. Daniels arrived Tuesday with 115,000 lbs. Number of arrivals in this department for the week, 11; receipts 1,140,000 lbs., the largest amount for any weeks this year. Receipts of Georges codfish, 474,000 lbs—22 fares. Mackerel have been in good receipt. We notice 32 arrivals from the home grounds, landing 7,500 lbs. One fare 260 bbls. Bays shipped home, and schr. Ames Cutter is on the way home with 280 bbls. The schr. Wildfire is high one for the week of the Shore fleet, landing 380 bbls.; the schr. Col. Jonas H. French comes next, with 360 bbls., and several of the fleet hail for 300 bbls. Whole number of arrivals for the week, 78; receipts, 1,514,000 lbs. codfish, 563,200 lbs. halibut, 7,790 bbls mackerel, against 66 arrivals, 1,104,000 lbs. codfish, 211,500 lbs. halibut and 2,955 bbls. mackerel for the corresponding week of last year. Last week we reported 108 arrivals, with 1,347,000 lbs. codfish, 176,300 lbs. halibut, and 6,260 bbls. mackerel, giving a total of 3,785,300 lbs. of fish, the largest amount for any week this year. The largest number of fishing arrivals reported for any week this year was 129, for the week ending June 3; largest receipts of codfish, 2,050,000 lbs.,

week ending June 10; largest George's receipts, 1,575,000 lbs. codfish, 57,500 lbs. halibut (75 arrivals) week ending June 3; largest mackerel receipts, 6,260 bbls. last week.—Cape Ann Advertiser.

Edison Beaten.

AN ELECTRIC MOTOR ALREADY IN THE FIELD.

(New York Mail.)

It will be a surprise to Mr. Edison that he has been outdone in devising a method for applying electricity as a motive power on railways. The announcement of Mr. Stephen Dudley Field's invention will be the first intimation to the wizard of Menlo Park that he is likely to lose the contract for supplying electric motors upon our elevated railways. The filing of the caveat by Field indicates that his work has been in advance of both that of Edison and that of Prof. Siemens, of Berlin. The fame into which the young inventor will come at a leap, if his claims are sustained and the test of his invention is satisfactory, will be the most remarkable because he plucks his honors from the grasp of the most distinguished experimenters with the electric force the world contains. It is the fact the young inventor has beaten Edison, unless his friends are wholly deceived as to the worth of his invention, that creates extraordinary interest in its achievement, beyond the eager desire for a substitute for the steam locomotive in city rapid transit. Edison's attitude towards the young rival will be watched by eager eyes throughout the nation. The new invention will be tested on the elevated roads, and if successful, will be adopted. It is claimed for the invention that it does without the fuel, smoke, oil, heat and noise of locomotives, and permits the highest speed consistent with safety. Another point urged in its favor is that an attachment has been provided which will render a collision between two trains impossible, each train automatically preserving a safe distance from the next succeeding one. The brakes will be operated by electric currents used in propelling the electric motor.

He knew he had cut a man, but had no idea of the injury till word was brought to him at a later hour, when he attempted to make his escape. In connection with this affair, another negro named Fred Hill was committed to jail on Friday, as being accessory after the fact on having gone to Mitchell's house soon after the stabbing and warned him that the officers were coming to arrest him, and advised him to escape as soon as possible.—Hc.
