A NATION MOURNS.

Sympathy With the Bereft.

Royal Sufferers.

LONDON, Jan. 16. The upper and middle classes are most keenly touched by the incident of the Duke's death. Thousands, clad in mourning, have flocked to Marlborough House to record their names, and throughout the capital well-dressed folks generally are donning some badge of grief. Apprehension is felt regarding the Princess of Wales. She takes the death of her son very much to heart, and refuses to be comforted. Her long service in the sick rooms of both Prince George and Prince Victor has had the effect of greatly debilitating her, and to-day she is completely prostrated. The Princess Victoria May, whose sorrow at the loss of her betrothed husband seems to increase rather than to grow less as time passes, is prostrated by the intensity of her grief.

Marine Disaster.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16. The barque Allington from Cork reports, December 29th, fell in with the barque Countess of Dufferin from St. John for Londonderry with lumber, in sinking condition. She stayed by her till daylight and then with great difficulty took off Captain Dobbie and the crew, ten in number. They were badly frost-bitten and all suffered terribly, not having tasted food or water for six days.

Refuse to Sympathise.

LONDON, Jan. 16. The Miners Federation, in session at Stoke-on-Trent yesterday, rejected a motion by a vote of 19 to 13 to adopt a resolution of sympathy with the Royal Family on account of the death of the Duke of Clarence.

Another Apology.

TORONTO, Jan. 16. The Globe of yesterday made another cringing apology for its false statement connecting Lady Macdonald with the Northwest land speculation.

Obituary.

LONDON, Jan. 16. Lady Victoria Alexandrina, wife of Baron Sandhurst, one of the foremost women politicians in Great Britain, is dead.

General Telegraphic News.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 14.—The sale of school lands in Manitoba to-day realized an average of \$9 per acre, being twenty-five per cent. in advance of the previous sale three years ago, although the lands sold to-day are not nearly so advantageously located.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 14.—The Novosti, commenting on the excitement displayed by the French press in regard to the death of the Khedive and the continued occupation of Egypt by the British, condemns the demand made by the French newspapers for the immediate evacuation of that country by the British. The Novosti adds:—"France at present ought not to provoke international conflicts. She should rather temporize with the aim of eventually obliging the British to evacuate Egypt of her own accord."

PARIS, Jan. 12.—The Paix says:—"King Humbert has made overtures to the Pope, offering to compromise the questions at issue between the States and the Vatican. The terms offered by King Humbert, while maintaining the rights of the crown, are fully satisfactory to the Vatican." The paper adds that the Pope is much pleased that the ice has been broken and that important results will probably follow.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Advices have been received from Lagos that the king of Dahomey has contracted with the German government to supply laborers at £16 per man, and that the king has already consigned 300 men and 100 women to the German authorities.

ROME, Jan. 14.—The new repeating rifle adopted by Italy will be provided with a new type of bayonet, much shorter than the one now used. A lieutenant of artillery has invented a new cartridge which according to official reports, is destined greatly to modify the prevailing views concerning projectiles. The powder adopted will develop progressively the effects of the gas arising from its combustion, increasing to an extraordinary degree the initial velocity of the ball. It is also reported that the weight of the equipments of the Italian soldiers will soon be reduced sufficiently to allow them to carry in the field one hundred and fifty rounds of the small calibre cartridge.

PARIS, Jan. 34.—A despatch from Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, says 50 army officers have been arrested in that city on a charge of being implicated in a plot against the lives of Prince Ferdinand, ruler of Bulgaria, and M. Stambouloff, Bulgarian prime minister. The despatch says that a rumor is current in Belgrade that Prince Ferdinand had a narrow escape from being poisoned by the palace cook.
