### Return Of German Assets Poses Problem For The U.S.

WASHINGTON (CP) — If the United States goes through with its plan to return German assets seized during the Second World War, it will be violating some of its international obligations. It also will make it tough for some of its European allies to resist German pressure for the return of war booty they accepted in lieu of reparations for the damage inflicted by German arms.

The U.S. plan, announced recently by the White House and now under study by a congressional committee, is to compensate American holders of war claims against Germany and then divide up the remainder among individual Germans who want their assets back.

The White House statement said this is in keeping with "historic American policy of maintaining the sanctity of private property even in wartime," but there is little doubt here that the move was timed to assist Chancellor Konrad Adenauer in the crucial West German elections next month. Adenauer has been pressing for the return of the assets for years.

Germany, by accepting the return of assets, also would be violating international treaty. Under the Bonn Convention of 1952 and the Paris Protocol of 1954, she agreed to pay her own nationals for property seized abroad during the war. Instead, she has been pressing the United States for a return of the assets.

### R.C.M.P. Add Another Name To The Most Wanted List

OTTAWA (CP) — The RCMP's list of most-wanted criminals, which had dwindled to the smallest total in its five-year history, got an addition Friday in John Frederick Meagher, 26-year-old Toronto salesman.

Meagher was facing a charge of robbery with violence when he escaped custody in Toronto April 1956. He was arrested in the city by car from Don Jail to the city hall.

### Talks Dealt With Power Resources In Maritimes

OTTAWA (CP) — The new Conservative government has been urged to make two major changes to proposals made earlier this year by the Liberals to aid in electrical power development in the Maritimes.

### New York Stock Market Shows Firmness Signs

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market gave ground again last week, but showed signs of trying to halt its late summer decline.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost \$3 on the week at \$178.30, compared with a drop of \$3.40 the week before. Actually, the average was a shade higher Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, but plunged the other days.

The five most active stocks on the New York Stock Exchange were Bethlehem Steel, off 3/4 at 45 1/2; American Express, off 1/2 at 27 1/2; International Nickel, off 1/2 at 85; and Hudson Bay Mining, off 3/4 at 55 1/2. Others included Aluminum Ltd., off 1/4 at 42; Canadian Pacific, off 1/2 at 32 1/2; and Distillers-Searams, off 1/2 at 28 1/2.

The five most active stocks on the American Exchange, most of which were fractional, Jupiter Oil was down 1-16 at 3 3/16; and Canadian Marconi was down 1/4 at 3 1/2.

### Buyers Have No Trouble Filling Steel Needs Now

CLEVELAND (AP) — The drought is over for steel buyers after 18 years of scarcities of most items. Steel Magazine says. Practically all forms of steel will be available for the remainder of the year.

The buyer can specify the form and shape of steel he wants and be assured of getting it within a reasonable delivery time, the metalworking weekly said Saturday. Prices will be stable and no buyer should have to pay premiums over the established mill or warehouse prices.

While the steel supply will remain adequate, a strengthening in demand for fourth quarter delivery is looked for by buyers, the publication adds.

THISTED, Denmark (AP) — Kristine Bro, 57, walked up the aisle Friday with the man she had been engaged to marry for the last 38 years.

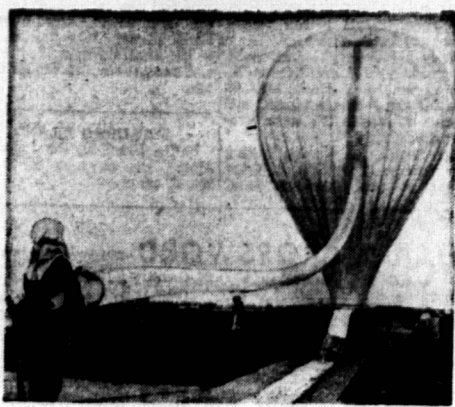

### Blueberries Suffer In N.S.

TRURO (CP) — Cool, damp weather is hurting Nova Scotia's chances for a bumper blueberry crop this season.

Gordon B. Kinsman, assistant director of the province's horticultural services, said early reports set this year's crop between 1 and 1.5 million pounds, about the same as in 1956 when there was a drop of 1,000,000 pounds.

A paper entitled, Education of Social Sense at University, read by Rev. Rodrigue Normandin, director of the University of Ottawa, compared admission requirements at Quebec universities with those of other provinces.

### Artist Becomes A House Painter

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP) — A newcomer from Norway who is a skilled artist in oil painting is using a different type of brush here to paint houses.

W. Raade, recent immigrant from Oslo, made his living on the oceans until 1941, as a sailor, mate and later captain of his own small vessel. During his years at sea he developed a hobby of oil painting, and found buyers for his works. Later he quit the sea to devote all his time to his art.

He arrived in Canada last April and found employment with a local contractor—as a house painter.

Mr. Raade has had no formal art training. He started painting at 15 and has since filled many canvases in sizes ranging from 12 by 16 inches to as large as five feet by six feet.

He says he prefers a canvas of 20 by 30 inches upon which most of his work has been done.

"Since coming to Canada have noticed one thing," he said. "The people back home hang large pictures on small walls. But in Canada, they put tiny pictures on large walls."
