Body Identified, No P.E.I. Inquest

ALBERTON — The body of a man found Thursday morning on the Hebron Shore near West Point, has been identified as John Killian Savoie of Gardner, Mass.

The late Mr. Savoie, who was vacationing in Buctouche, N. B., was reported drowned on June 30th when a small boat overturned in Buctouche Bay. Five companions were saved.

Mr. Savoie was in his 48th year. The remains were identified by relatives from New Brunswick yesterday and will be forwarded to his late home in Massachusetts. An inquest was held in Buctouche shortly after the drowning occurred and the jury ruled death was accidental.

MORE TELEPHONES
OTTAWA (CP)—There was a sharp increase in the number of telephones operating in Canada last year compared with 1957. The bureau of statistics reported Friday telephones operated by the 15 largest telephone systems numbered 4,809,568 at the end of 1958, up 6.5 per cent from the 4,515,000 sets in use a year earlier. The 15 companies operated 94 per cent of all telephones in Canada.

FWIC Elects Officers As Sessions Conclude

Expansion of Women's Institute activities to the northern territories of Canada is being sought by the Federated Women's Institute of Canada who concluded their annual meeting in Charlottetown yesterday.

In a resolution directed to the minister of northern affairs, it was asked that the department lend assistance in setting up a program which would be tailored to the needs of the area.

The Institute members point out that the Northland of Canada has become increasingly important to the economy of Canada and they feel that the people of the region could benefit greatly by a program as carried out by the Women's Institutes.

Mrs. E. J. Roylance, postmaster of Greenwood, British Columbia was elected president of the FWIC. She succeeds Mrs. Keith Rand of Port Williams, N.S.

Mrs. Roylance who is the mother of a married son and daughter has been an institute member for 30 years and is a past president of the British Columbia Women's Institute.

Other members of the national executive are Mrs. Keith Rand, past president, Mrs. James Haggerty, 1st vice-president, Napanee, Ontario, Mrs. Harry Kilpatrick, 2nd vice-president, Jacksonville, N.B., Mrs. George Clark St. John's, Nfld., and Mrs. Charles Shulver, Woodrow, Saskatchewan were named to the sub-executive.

As a closing gesture the retiring president, Mrs. Rand presented the new president with the jewelled president's pin, the seal of office, the lease of office and the gavel of authority.

Mrs. Rand and Mrs. W.L. Clark of Conquest, Sask., were in turn presented with life membership badges. Mrs. Roylance and Dr. Nancy Adams took part in the ceremony.

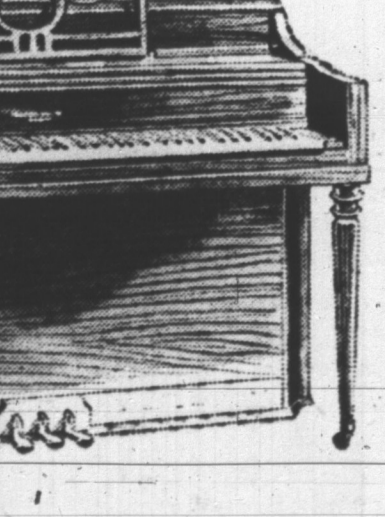
