

Nfld. Damage Reports Beginning To Trickle In

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The north and northeast coasts. Reports of heavy damage to fishery shore installations from the storm over the weekend began to trickle in as high winds abated.

Heaviest hit by the storm that packed winds as high as 80 miles per hour were the north-east coast areas which were pounded by mountainous seas for three days.

Pat Antle, secretary-manager of the Newfoundland Federation of Fishermen, said Sunday he expects to hear of many more reports of damage along the coast.

At Heart's Desire a break-water was heavily damaged and a road was washed away and two nearby fish stages and two smaller wharves were completely destroyed. Fishermen were able to pull all their boats onto the land before the storm reached its peak.

Two fishermen at Deer Harbor, Trinity Bay, had their fishing gear destroyed.

At least three boats were swamped at St. Paul's on the north coast of the Avalon Peninsula as high seas beat them onto the long shallow beach.

No injuries have been reported due to the storm.

S. Viet Nam Demonstration Is Crushed

SAIGON (AP)—A demonstration demanding the resignation of South Viet Nam's new civilian government has collapsed in face of a show of force by the military and police.

Dissident religious, political and student groups said, however, they planned new demonstrations later in the week.

The collapse of a planned march to the palace of President Phan Kiac Suu, the ceremonial chief of state, brought the government back to power last Wednesday, through its first political crisis. Huong warned dissidents Saturday his government would use force, if necessary, to halt demonstrations.

Price Index Holds Steady For October

OTTAWA (CP)—Lower food prices offset increases for clothing, housing and other goods and services in October to hold the Canadian consumer price index steady, unchanged from the September level.

The over-all index was, however, up 1 1/2 per cent from October last year.

Over the year food prices rose only fractionally but there were gains of four per cent in prices for health and personal care, and more than two per cent for

clothing, housing, and tobacco and alcohol.

The bureau of statistics Friday placed the October index at 133.6 points compared with 133.6 a year earlier. The index is based on 1949 prices equaling 100.

The DBS index of average weekly wages and salaries was 202.9 in August compared with 194.4 a year earlier, a rise of more than 4 1/2 per cent.

These shifts in prices were reported by the bureau for the September-to-October period.

The food index dropped 1.3 per cent to 131 from 132.7. Prices were lower for local fresh fruit and vegetables, beef, fresh pork, eggs, sugar and coffee. Prices went up for imported fruit and cured pork.

Clothing was 1.1 per cent higher at 120.7 compared with 119.4 in September; housing advanced slightly to 139.2 from 141.6; health rose 1.6 per cent to 170.4 from 167.7; recreation up to 131.1 from 130.3; tobacco and alcohol up to 121.4 from 120.2.

Police Sgt. Is Charged

MONTREAL (CP)—A police sergeant from suburban LaFleche has been charged in court with arson and conspiracy to defraud the city of \$15,000.

Sergeant Gilroy Malboeuf, 39, a member of the LaFleche force for three years, pleaded not guilty to the charges and was ordered held without bail pending a preliminary hearing Nov. 12.

Two other members of the LaFleche force have also been arrested in the case and have been suspended from the force.

Malboeuf was arrested by provincial police while on duty in LaFleche police headquarters Friday night.

He was charged with conspir-

ing to set fire to a building on Cartier Street in LaFleche and with actually starting it. Damage to the building was estimated at \$600.

CHARGES FRAUD

The third charge was that he attempted to defraud the municipality of \$15,000 by urging the city to buy a new fire truck.

Crown prosecutor Philippe Landry said in court that the fire had been set and another started in an attempt to get the city to buy a fire truck and to hire more policemen.

The city of LaFleche is under Quebec government trusteeship, having been declared bankrupt earlier this year.

Police Officer Is Cleared In N.Y. Shooting

NEW YORK (AP)—Police Lt. Thomas R. Gilligan was cleared of any criminal liability in the fatal shooting of a Negro boy which touched off widespread race rioting and violence here last summer.

Gilligan already had been absolved by a grand jury of any criminal liability. The police department's civilian complaint review board ruled unanimously Friday Gilligan committed no violations of rules and procedures of the department.

Various civil rights groups had demanded strong action against the lieutenant, who has been on sick leave since shortly after the shooting.

James Powell, 15, was shot in front of a building at 213 E. 76th St. July 16.

Gilligan said the youth swung at him more than once with a knife and that a warning shot

failed to deter him. The boy had been involved in an altercation with a building superintendent shortly before.

The civilian complaint review board is made up of three deputy police commissioners. During its inquiry it read the 1,603 pages of testimony taken by the grand jury, which heard 45 witnesses.

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FORMER YUGOSLAV FAMILY REUNITED

Olga Hasec, 10, is introduced to her 18-month-old sister Jeanie by their mother, Mrs. Anthony Hasec of Toronto, at Toronto International Airport. When Mr. and Mrs. Hasec escaped from Yugoslavia three years ago the weather was so bad that they decided to leave Olga, then 7, behind.

Last January the Yugoslav government issued Olga a passport to Canada and she was supposed to arrive in September but Canadian immigration officials held her up. A day after the story appeared in a Toronto news-

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
